The Problem. The Challenge.

The church council had a lively discussion in March as it reviewed Faith Lutheran's current financial status. The short version: **offerings have been significantly lower in the first months of 2014 than in previous years.** In January, giving dropped by 16% from what it had been just one year earlier.

While the council discussed this problem, many questioned how to communicate it to the congregation. This was not a question of logistics. Church leaders want to get the word out that Faith needs increased offerings, without creating a culture where people only give when there is a crisis. We remain thankful to the faithful people of this church who continue to support it, while still asking that they, and everyone else, step up and do more.

The Problem

Faith Lutheran reached several significant financial goals at the end of 2013. We met all our mission commitments with no borrowing for a 5th straight year. We paid off

all the operating debt from prior years when the church did have to borrow. We expanded our staff while reducing budgeted expenses for 2014. With all this, we still retained an \$18,000 cash balance entering 2014.

Despite spending below our already lowered budget, Faith already faces a \$35,000 deficit in 2014. Because of this, our church does not have funds to give timely support to ministries like Common Cup. We may soon be in a position of having to borrow again to meet basic monthly expenses.

We have so much to be thankful for as we begin 2014. But the many gifts Faith received at the end of 2013 seem to have created a sense of giving fatigue. With summer and the traditional drop in giving not far off, this is deeply troubling. We may be playing catch-up for the rest of 2014. Faith's leaders have worked hard for five years to improve the fiscal health of our

church dramatically. Now is the time to move forward, not to slip backward!

The Challenge

One thing seems clear as we write this on the first day of spring. It is time to challenge the church on its approach to and reasons for giving. That's right. We're extending a challenge to you.

We challenge you to discover the joy that comes with giving. Let's break the cycle of lurching from crisis to crisis. Let's respond in generous gratitude to the boundless blessings God pours out on us. Let's commit to the mission God is doing through Faith Lutheran. Please prayerfully consider your giving in light of how God has blessed you.

We challenge you to recognize that giving equals mission. We will show you glimpses of what this means throughout 2014. Faith's freedom from operating debt increases our ability to further the work of God's kingdom. The people of Faith can do face-to-face ministry in our own community, but the dollars you give can be easily used at home and sent all over the earth. We still have the potential in 2014 to provide and support ministries both at home and around the world.

We challenge you to continue to give generously. Even as we thank God for Faith's much-improved financial condition, we also challenge Faith's members to give generously as God first blesses us, so that we can support more Christian work here and around the world. Just imagine what new and important work God can do through us for Jesus' sake in 2014!



When I was a child (and in early youth as well), I always dreaded Lent. It meant an extra worship service for 6 weeks, and then a week of special services... Maundy Thursday, Good Friday... not a young child's first choice. Easter always seemed like release from prison, especially if the weather was nice. I could play basketball or baseball after school on Wednesday nights, not get dressed for church. I'm ashamed to admit to this childish perspective now. Especially since I now look forward to Lent as time for deepening and enrichment of my faith, as I walk with Jesus to the cross, fully realizing Easter, with its promise of new life in Christ, comes quickly after crucifixion. It is a time to experience the amazing grace of a Savior Who willingly goes to that cross for me.

At some point in our imaginary walk to the cross, Jesus lets go of my hand and moves on alone. I become an observer of Jesus' crucifixion. I do not experience the nails or the excruciating thirst or the terrible suffering, though my sinfulness says I really should. Jesus is taking on MY sin. He is enduring MY punishment. Why am I not there, suffering with Him? Of course, the answer is clear in Scripture. He is my ransom.

St. Paul says, "For our sake He made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God." (II Cor. 5:21). And Peter says, "He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by His wounds you have been healed." (I Peter 2:24). I should be on that cross; Jesus is instead, "For You," He says.

So Easter, celebrated on April 20, is God's final declaration of triumph over my sin, my death, my condemnation. As Jesus arose, so will I — HIS PROMISE! Every day, in fact, is a "little Easter" in which God gives us His Spirit to lift us out of our enslavement to all wrongs and priorities, to live first and

foremost for Him. God bless us all with this Good News!

We can share a bit of Easter joy in our Seniors Potluck meeting this month, with the residents of The Oaks and The Pines. In previous years we've met at The Oaks. This year we'll switch to The Pines, where we'll meet in their dining/community room for program and treats. Q: Easter is three weeks later than it was last year. Why does it move around so much?

A: Unlike most events in Jesus' life, the Bible is quite specific about when his crucifixion and resurrection occurred. All four accounts of the Gospel tie those events to the Jewish festival of Passover.

The date of Passover, however, is still determined by the lunar calendar, as it was in Jesus' day, which does not match up with the solar calendar that we use, so the date moves around on our calendar. Easter is nearly always celebrated in the same week as Passover, although different reckonings of the lunar calendar sometimes separate them. Also because of different calendar reckonings, Orthodox churches (Eastern, Greek, Russian, etc.) use a different date for Easter, often a week or two after churches like ours that come from the Western tradition.

The date of Easter is determined by this formula: the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal (spring) equinox. In this formula, the equinox is set as March 21, even though in many years (like this one) spring actually begins on March 20. So, the earliest possible date for Easter is March 22 and the latest is April 25.

BOOK SPOTLIGHT

Colleen Coble's *Rosemary Cottage* takes place on the Outer Banks of North Carolina. It has three main themes, which weave together at the conclusion.

One of the main characters, Amy, is not satisfied with a “death by drowning” of her brother, since he was an experienced surfer. She is a qualified midwife who decides to set up her practice on the Outer Banks while she investigates her brother's death. Amy moves into the family vacation home called Rosemary Cottage.

The other main character, Curtis, is on the Coast Guard rescue team. His sister died when she was struck by a jet ski while swimming. Curtis, a young, single Christian man, is left to care for his sister's little 2 year old daughter.

As Amy and Curtis join forces to investigate the deaths of their siblings, they encounter danger themselves. As their lives are threatened, they become more convinced that their siblings were murdered—but why would anyone want to harm their brother and sister? In the end they find that greed for power and money caused the death of their siblings.
