There are times where I feel like poor Oliver, once again begging for more money for the church. There may be times when you feel like Pastor Scott and I are like Oliver, always begging for more. We don't like to do it, because we know that many of you don't like us to do it.

"They're always talking about money!"

That is not the impression we want to give, nor do we really think that is the case. If anything, we want the impression to be, "They're always talking about Jesus!"

That said, we need to talk about money. We need to talk about giving, because the church needs it and you need it, too. Let me explain:

The church needs you to give more because ministry costs money, and offerings are our only source of income. We are currently behind last year's pace for offerings received, with the summer months just beginning. (Please see the financial update on page 6) Thriving ministries like FLY Night, 56er's, Seniors' ministry, Family Fun Days, FaithLife Camp and Club 218 take resources to run. In addition, Faith needs money to continue to explore creative ways to reach and support college students, to reach out in our community, to maximize technology in an effort to communicate the gospel in new ways, and to retain excellent staff members. Just recently, we have been presented with the possibility of bringing a pastoral intern on board, something that would greatly bless that future pastor and benefit our mission here. The only real obstacle to proceeding with such an opportunity is money. Should that hold us back from doing the ministry God presents us? Pray about giving more always in proportion to your income, keeping in mind 2 Corinthians 8:12: "For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has - not according to what one does not have."

Not only does the church need you to give, but you also have a need to give. It is an act of worship! You see, in a way we are all like poor Oliver. We are all beggars. We have nothing. We are completely at the mercy of our generous Lord. And here's the good news: He gives! He gave us this wonderful world to live in. He gives us our daily bread and the family we eat it with. Most importantly, he gave us his Son, who died for our sins, so that now he can forgive us in his Son's name. He pours abundantly into our needy lives, and then asks that we, too, give in response to his endless generosity.

So give! Give for the sake of your church and our mission. Even more, give because to you much has been given. Learn the joy of giving!

"The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." -2 Corinthians 9:6-7

Stump the pastor

Q: Is the Lord Dead?

A: This question formed the headline of an article that Wendy Mayland spotted. The author, Pastor Steven Gjerde, poses it to his confirmation students at the start of each year. The initial results, he reports, are usually not encouraging.

"It's not that they deny the resurrection, these little believers of ours. They just don't get what the resurrection is, or maybe they don't get what death is. As one student explained to me: 'Well, on Easter, Jesus went to heaven, right? And now when we die, we go to heaven. So isn't going to heaven being dead?' In such a view, resurrection has no earthly or bodily reality—it all happened and now happens somewhere else—and death is no longer the enemy to be destroyed, but just the name for life after...well, life after life, I guess. As a result, Jesus being dead is no problem. It just means he's in heaven, with all the other dead people.

"But (this is) a crucial matter for any church confessing the lordship of Jesus Christ. The resurrection of the crucified One reveals His lordly power: the power to greet a dead sinner, give him life, and bring him into God's future. The fact that Jesus revealed this power within an earthly span of time (on the third day) and in a particular place (Jerusalem) declares His willingness to exercise this power already now, on earth, through the continued ministry of His church, until He comes to transform our lowly bodies to be like His glorious one. Without those details of the resurrection, the lordship of Jesus Christ easily floats into some other realm (heaven) and Jesus remains, for all practical purposes, dead."

Is the Lord dead? No! But he *was* really and truly dead on Good Friday. Only the divine power of the Father was able to raise him again. The difference between the dead Jesus and the risen Lord Jesus is like night and day, just as the difference between the reality of death and the promise of eternal life when Christ resurrects our bodies on the Last Day is like night and day.

The desire to deny or downplay death, to de-fang it and disguise its awful power runs strong in people, Christians and non-Christians alike. But it does not work—and we all know it. The tears and anguish that always accompany death prove it.

The only solution to death is if the Author of life overturns it—and the heart of the Gospel is that God in Christ has done exactly that. "If for this life we have only hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died...for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ." (I Corinthians 15:18-21) The Lord *was* dead, but not anymore. Jesus lives, and by his grace, all who die in him will also be raised from the dead—body and soul, just as he was—to live with him forever.

Why Give? A Reflection on Biblical Stewardship

It is no secret that most churches—Faith Lutheran among them—get a big financial boost from Easter and Christmas offerings. In recent years, Faith has asked for special *Alleluia!* offerings around Easter, because already by then the church has usually opened up a significant deficit. This year, because the deficit was not as dire, we did not ask for an *Alleluia!* offering. Sure enough, our Easter offerings were some \$6,600 lower than last year, even though our worship attendance was a bit higher, and offerings for the month fell \$15,000 from last year.

That surprising difference, I think, points to one of the essential tenets of Biblical stewardship. The goal of Christian giving is for us to give according to how God has blessed us, not on the current state of the church budget or a special appeal. It has often been stated this way: *as Christians, we not only give to needs, but we have a need to give*.

Faith Lutheran is still not in a financial crisis—thank God! But so far this year, *offerings are the lowest they have been since 2010!* As we move into summer, that "missing" \$15,000 and overall decline in giving may well loom large. Whether it does or not, though, misses the deeper point, which is the call to regular, generous, faithful giving in proportion to how God first blesses me and you. (One way to do that is to use *Simply Giving*, which allows you to give your offerings by electronic fund transfer. Call the church to find out more.)

So what do you think? Could Faith Lutheran reach the point where offerings were sufficient and growing each year—without having to make special appeals at Easter or Christmas? If we understand our need to give, I have no doubt of it, for God provides for us with divine regularity and generosity. Giving to God that reflects God's giving to us would surely be more than enough!
