Starting on July 20, I am privileged to begin a sabbatical that will last until the end of August. The word sabbatical comes from sabbath and, like the Sabbath Day, it is related to rest and learning. Faith Lutheran offers its pastors one month of sabbatical leave for every five years of service. For a variety of reasons, I have not taken any sabbatical time in nearly ten years here, so I am stretching the month to six weeks.

Sabbaticals are best known in the academic world, where tenured professors are released from teaching every seventh year. They often use that time to write books or complete other projects. Sabbaticals are less common in the church—which is why I am so grateful to receive one!—but the purpose is much the same. It offers a break from the weekly routine of church life in order to re-charge and attend to projects that are hard to complete otherwise.

I have a long list of projects I would like to pursue during this time—more like six months' worth, rather than six weeks! I hope to spend a lot of the time reading in areas like the role of the church in addressing public policy, Lutheran history (in preparation for the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation in 2017 and the 150th anniversary of Faith Lutheran in 2020), and stewardship theology and practice. I may also prepare for publication some Bible studies I have led and consider more effective ways of teaching confirmation. However, in order not to neglect the "sabbath" part of a sabbatical, I may well need to pare all this down to a less ambitious agenda!

Please be aware that, during this sabbatical, I will not be available for any of my usual pastoral duties. Contact the other pastors or Marsha Schmit with any pastoral needs or church matters. I will be at home for much of this time, however, so you may see me around town and very probably at Sunday worship, but I will be "off duty".

Again, I am so grateful for this gift from you, the congregation of Faith Lutheran Church. I ask for your prayers during this sabbatical, that it may be a fruitful and refreshing time that will return blessings to the church's ministry.

What the" Share the Love Offering" Did and Could Do through You



music notes

Since the summer months are slow, I thought I'd revisit some of the information I learned while researching Bach last year.

For those music history buffs out there, you'll find you run into the terms Hymn and Chorale. Bach wrote hymns as well as chorales. They're both sung in church and they, by and large, sound similar, especially when played on the organ. So what is the difference? If you're wondering if this is at all relevant, we sing Hymns and Chorales at our own church!

Hello friends and family of Faith Lutheran! My name is Josiah Frusti and, as some of you know our own church!

The difference between a hymn and a choral is slightly ambiguous, but perhaps the most distinct difference is the rhythm. Chorales are much more rhythmic, featuring more syncopation and often have more movement from the inner parts. Chorales are also in AAB form. Think of "A Mighty Fortress is Our God." Also, chorales were made famous by Bach and are featured in cantatas, but are not themselves cantatas. Hymns are typically standalone. A cantata is a piece for an orchestra and choir that many composers used as a form for composition. So, Hymns are standalone and less rhythmic. Chorales are more rhythmic, in AAB form, and are featured in cantatas. Cantatas are longer or major pieces written for choir and orchestra.

I'd like to point out this fact: An interesting linkage from Martin Luther to Bach is that Bach was raised in a town where Martin Luther preached, and performed music. In fact, the two attended the same Latin grammar school as boys. According to the records, Luther and Bach were treble singers in the youth chorus at the church, making it very likely that the two stood in the same spot as choir boys. Bach was raised in this cradle of Lutheranism, by a family of musicians. It only seems appropriate that he would become the most important figure in Lutheran music that ever lived.

Q: If a person has to be baptized to be saved, what happens if a baby dies in the delivery room?

A: The death of a newborn is a heart-breaking situation that - thank God! -happens far less often today than in the past. Many emergency baptisms have been administered in hospitals to avoid exactly this situation.

The concern behind this question, however, may reflect a misunderstanding about baptism, one that the Church itself has sometimes fostered. It looks at baptism as a way to get (or even force) God to do something He otherwise wouldn't. It assumes that salvation depends on baptism and God is bound by whether it is done or not. It tends to turn baptism either into a magic spell or a heaven insurance policy that is our ticket past an angry God who would otherwise destroy us.

Salvation, though, depends on God - completely and always. While God has every reason to be angry at this rebellious world, Christ Jesus revealed instead that "God our Savior...desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth." (I Timothy 2:3-4) Baptism is the means by which God fulfills that desire in the lives of individuals. It was instituted for our sake, not God's, to assure us of forgiveness of sin and new life in Christ, and to adopt us into the family of Christ. Baptism binds us to God's will, not God to our will.

So, if a child tragically dies before baptism, we simply commend him or her into the hands of a gracious God, trusting in His saving will accomplished in Christ. At the same time, we are called to give baptism the highest importance, not as some regulation to be fulfilled, but as the beginning of a life lived in loving, trusting relationship with God our Savior.

Imagine Capital Campaign

The week that this newsletter was compiled was pretty wild around the church. Some 60 young children from Faith and Christ the King attended Vacation Bible School. Another 20 children began another summer of Club 218, the day camp for children in need run by our youth each summer. A large funeral occurred on one day, with an even larger visitation the day before. Soloists practiced in the music room and meals were prepared in the kitchen.



Ministry teams and the church council met one evening and the Drive-In Diner was scheduled for another, before weather forced a postponement. Many smaller gatherings could be added to the list.

What made it possible for all these ministry efforts to happen in one week? Space! The room available in the sanctuary and Foundation, on the third floor and in the youth space, in the offices and gathering areas was the necessary prerequisite for Faith to reach so many people in so many ways.

And what makes all that space possible? Your generous, steady support of the *Imagine* capital campaign allows us to cover the costs of the building without impinging on our ministry budget. The church has made astounding progress on the mortgage in its first five years. Your continued generous support will keep this space for ministry available and affordable going forward.

Why Give? A Reflection on Biblical Stewardship

At the recent board meeting of the New Hope Mission Society (NHMS), which was founded at Faith and supports a variety of ministries to Muslims, we heard again about the plight of Muslim converts to Christianity. Most often, they lose everything—jobs, family ties, friends and community. Many of them live in poverty beyond our imagining. NHMS provides funding for education and job training, as well as evangelism, because they have virtually nothing to their names.

At least 10% (a tithe) of every dollar given to Faith's General Fund is given away to support efforts like those of NHMS to help people in need here and around the world. The more generous we are, the more funds are available for these efforts.

Jesus said, "From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required," and thanks to the blessings of this rich land, most of us are in the "much has been given" category. How is God calling you to put the gifts He has given you to work? (See the note about the Share the Love Offering on p. 2 to see what just \$150.00/month could do for poor women in India.) Does your giving reflect what Jesus would "require" of you? In thanks and trust, let's commit to making the best use possible of the treasure God has entrusted to us.
