The other day I clicked on a link an old friend had posted on Facebook. Why? Because the title was "23 unbelievable facts that will destroy your understanding of time!" How could I resist?

- While still a young man, the tide of popular opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. One of them denied Him. He was turned over to His enemies. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed upon a cross between two thieves. While He was dying His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He had on earth His coat. When He was dead, He was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.
- Nineteen long centuries have come and gone. I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, all the navies that were ever built; all the parliaments that ever sat and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as powerfully as has that one solitary life.

But that's not the most mind-blowing thing. What most blows my mind is that Jesus did this all for me, and for you, even though neither of us deserve it! So as we continue to journey with Jesus to the cross my prayer is that the old, old story is renewed in your heart, and that the good news continues to blow your mind! See you in church,

Why Give? A Reflection on Biblical Stewardship

The Bible often stresses the importance of "first fruits" offerings. In the agricultural setting of ancient Israel, that meant the first crops harvested each year. But it still applies to all of us who work for a paycheck instead. God calls us to determine and give our offerings *before* we pay other expenses.

Why is it important to give our offerings first? One reason is practical. Offerings are all freely given. God never sends a bill! If offerings are put off until last or given from what is "left over," we can often find that there is not much to give.

More importantly, "first fruits" offerings are a matter of *trust*. To give first builds faith that God provides everything we have and are, and will continue to do so. In Malachi 3, God challenged Judah, "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse...and thus put me to the test... See if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing."

That is not some get-rich-quick scheme. To give first will likely affect how we manage the rest of our money. But God has promised and proven that He is trustworthy and

will continue to give us every good thing we need. So, go ahead. Take God up on this offer and see what blessings flow into your life.



If Jews are God's chosen people, why did God let the Holocaust happen?

A: This question from a confirmand is one of the most haunting of our day. It has challenged the faith of Jews and Christians alike. I do not pretend to know the answer to it. These are only a few thoughts that come to mind.

First, while the scale and systematic nature of the Holocaust were unprecedented, the hatred of Jews that drove it was, tragically, nothing new. The first attempt at Jewish genocide is recorded in Esther, in the Bible. Persecution of Jews (though rarely genocidal) is one of the blackest marks on Christian history. Is it possible that, simply because God did elect the Jews as His Chosen People, they elicit such persistent hatred and oppression?

Very possibly, because when God Himself came to this world in Jesus, he was also rejected, abused and executed—at the hands of Jews and Gentiles alike! Today, Christianity has overtaken Judaism for the dubious honor of being the world's most persecuted religion. It seems that wherever God is at work in this sinful world, opposition results. Indeed, hatred of Jews—and increasingly Christians—persists and is growing in our day.

So why does God allow such opposition and enmity toward the Jews to occur? The best answer I can give is an insight borrowed from a fellow pastor. "A long time ago, God decided not to *fix* the world, but to *save* it instead." In order to redeem people and the world, which are both not only affected *by* sin, but infected *with* it, it is due to God's mercy that He has chosen not simply to eradicate evil, for that would mean eradicating the whole creation (Matthew 13:24-30).

Instead, God took on all the powers of evil in Christ Jesus and won an eternal victory over them through his death and resurrection. As that victory works its way to completion, the forces of evil still seek to do all the damage they can, but they cannot win. The will of God, revealed and achieved in Christ, shall be fulfilled and evil will be destroyed forever. Until then, we join St. Paul in praying, "Our Lord, come!" (I Corinthians 16:22)

BOOK SPOTLIGHT

This month, the Faith Lutheran Book Club read and discussed *The Captive Heart* by Dale Cramer.

In the spring of 1922, Caleb Bender escaped religious oppression in Ohio and brought his extended Amish family to start a new settlement in Paradise Valley in Mexico. It was a difficult move, building new homes and digging a well, laborious, and the area dangerous with threatening bandits traveling around. But the family prospered with their new crops in the lush valley. Two more Amish families came to the area to join them and more homes were built.

With talk of a minister coming, babies being born and crops thriving, things were good in Paradise Valley. Then things started to take a turn for the worse. Not only were the families being preyed upon by bandits, disease was spreading and a few of their small community died. During these difficult times, they relied heavily on their faith. They also relied on one of the locals, Domingo, who had experience with the bandits and wasn't afraid of standing up to them even if it meant using violence which the Amish were strongly against. One of Caleb's daughters, Miriam, finds herself falling in love with Domingo and wonders if he feels the same. At the same time, she struggles with the possibility of a relationship with this native man who is not Amish and would force her to choose between him and her family.

This historical fiction is well-written, an interesting topic and intriguing to read. I recommend it!
