Now, what does this mean for you and for the life of our church?


First of all, I hope you like the color **red**! The Reformation color will be prominently featured throughout the year!

Q: Why do the colors of the altar cloths change in the church? What do they mean?

A: For hundreds of years, worship services in the Western Christian Church were held in Latin, even though most people no longer spoke or even understood

it. The reason for that is a long story, but one consequence of it was that a lot of Christian teaching was done through visual symbols: stained glass windows, statues, morality plays and liturgical symbols. The colors of the paraments (cloths on the altar, pulpit and lectern) and the priest's vestments were one form of this visual teaching.

Most churches that use traditional liturgy use five colors: blue, white, red, purple and green. Some include scarlet (different from red), gold or black. The colors were assigned symbolic meanings long ago, although it is not entirely clear how those meanings were derived.

The colors change with the seasons of the church year. Right now, we are in "the long green season," the Sundays after Pentecost. From the Second Sunday after Pentecost (usually in June) to the Sunday before Christ the King (end of November), the color remains green, like the lush green plants that grow during this time. That is because this season focuses on growing in our faith and discipleship. The readings in worship come from Jesus' teaching and ministry.

The other half of the church year follows the course of Jesus' life:

Advent prophesies his coming, long ago and on the Last Day. The color is blue, symbolizing hope. Christmas celebrates Jesus' birth and the color is white, which signifies purity and joy. Epiphany recounts events that revealed his divine identity as his ministry began. The color is green.

Lent jumps ahead to Jesus' suffering and death, so the color is purple, which denotes suffering. Easter returns to white to celebrate his resurrection from the dead.

The Day of Pentecost (not the whole season) uses red to denote the fire of the Holy Spirit.

Mixed into those seasons are many church festivals, which have their own color. Epiphany includes The Baptism of our Lord and The Transfiguration, when white replaces the usual green. Holy Trinity comes on the first Sunday after Pentecost and is also white. Reformation Sunday (on the last Sunday in October) uses red instead of the usual green. On Good Friday, either the paraments are black, to suggest mourning, or none are used at all.

In our highly literate culture, the liturgical colors may not be as important as they once were for helping to communicate the faith. They still, however, add richness, beauty and meaning to the weekly and annual rhythm of the church year.

### **Faith-full Finances**

Last December, Faith Lutheran received an astounding year-end offering. Nine months later, we are still living off that bounty. So far in 2016, offerings have fallen \$56,000 short of expenses, but the

church has been able to keep its commitment not to borrow money to meet our ministry needs. If 2017 is going to proceed as smoothly, however, that general fund deficit will need to be made up by the end of the year. Your continued generous support of the ministry God is doing through Faith Lutheran is much needed and much, much appreciated!



### Imagine Capital Campaign

In the six years that Faith has had a mortgage on the new building, we have made remarkable progress on the loan. One-third of the balance is already paid and the rest is being reduced on a much accelerated schedule. In doing that, the church has never once struggled to make a monthly payment. When extra principal payments have been made, the balance in the capital campaign account

has not diminished, but grown back! Thank you for such generous, faithful support, which has allowed Faith to manage this debt so effectively.

### **Using an IRA for a Good Cause**

DID YOU KNOW that you can put a traditional IRA (not a Roth) to work for your church or other charity? And that both you and the charity will benefit from it? Starting at age 70½, people must take what is called a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from each traditional IRA they own. These RMD's are taxable, but only if they increase one's income. They are not taxed if they are donated directly to a qualified charity, like Faith Lutheran Church. (All this assumes that the donor is not depending on the income from the RMD right now.) It is important to work with a financial planner to be fully informed about this process. For example, the RMD must go directly to the qualified charity for it not to be taxable. This is a great option for some people to support the church or other worthy causes. Congress has made this a permanent program, so these gifts can be made in any year.

## Music Ministry Is in Good Hands

We were sorry to see Mike Lauer leave his position as our Director of Music and Worship. We wish him every blessing in his new position at Central Lutheran in Elk River, MN. Faith's Personnel Committee is in the process of seeking a replacement for Mike.

In the meantime, our music ministry is in very good hands. Our main worship accompanists, Ronda Eckhart, Shirley Holtz, Lara Liepold and Marc Vaillancourt, along with others who play with them or are willing substitutes, continue their faithful service.

In addition, Dave Skaar has stepped in to direct Faith Singers and Sue Graff is leading Ringers of Faith during this interim period. We are so grateful to all our gifted music leaders and to God for equipping them to help us "make a joyful noise to the Lord."

### **OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD BOXES**



OK, I know it's hard to think "Christmas" already. It just turned to "Fall," for goodness sake. Christmas includes snow in Minnesota and we don't want snow just yet, or never. But we are at that time when we need to think ahead and think about Christmas being about Jesus...His birth and life on earth, working out our salvation and our Christian life in Him.

Part of that reality is our need to be witnesses. As Christians we seek out every possible way to share the truth of God's love for broken humanity through Jesus.

One very simple way is **Operation Christmas Child** boxes. The "Special Report" I received with OCC program supplies has pictures and stories about how children, knowing they will receive a box of useful items, and some trinkets, opens their minds and hearts to hear about Jesus. The things you buy - toys, pencils and note pads, shirts, underwear, crayons, jump ropes - are tangible tools to create childlike interest in the God above Who dearly longs for them to know Him as God and Savior. Whether they live in Belize, Peru, Moldova, Africa, Malawi, Fiji, Nepal or Ecuador, **Operation Christmas Child** boxes can be powerful evangelism tools pointing to Jesus as Savior and Lord. Please...PLEASE...join in this effort. We'd like to "raise the bar" on the number of boxes we pack and ship. Can you help us? Sure you can.

### Here's how:

<u>Pick up a brochure</u> from the church - they're all over the place for your convenience. They give complete information on items to purchase for packing, and for various ages. Please pack your boxes according to those instructions exactly.

If you don't wish to pack a box completely, you can bring <u>regular size</u> shoe boxes to the church office (please, <u>NOT huge</u> boxes or plastic containers).

You can bring articles to have others pack at our packing sessions. Be sure they will fit in regular size shoe boxes. Bring as much as you wish. We've never had too much.

You can help with shipping costs. It costs \$ 7.00 per box to ship abroad. Make checks payable to "SAMARITAN'S PURSE," or bring cash to the church office.

### We will have **TWO group box-packing opportunities**:

Your first opportunity is an intergenerational activity on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>November 2<sup>nd</sup></u>, <u>from 8:30-10:00 a.m.</u> This is a school "Late Start" date. Adults, Senior Citizens and students of any age can work together on assembling and packing boxes until the time is up or the items assembled on the tables are gone. It has always been an exciting time.

A second packing session is <u>Thursday</u>, <u>November 10<sup>th</sup></u>, at Seniors' Potluck. Anyone can help at this session, Senior Citizen or not. You can join in the potluck dinner, or arrive at 1:00 p.m. for just packing boxes. Either way you are welcome to join in fun with a definite mission perspective.

If you are packing and dropping off your own boxes, note that the **<u>DEADLINE</u>** is **SUNDAY**, **<u>NOVEMBER 13<sup>TH</sup></u>** (Boxes will picked up Nov. 14<sup>th</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup>.)

**HEY....don't just lay this aside!!** Start planning. Whether extensive or limited, every contribution is important. You can bring a tubful, or a handful; everything counts. Please, let's join together for a superior effort and "over the top" results. **Thank you!!**
