## stump the pastor

*Q: In the explanation to The Lord's Prayer, the Small Catechism says that we ask God to protect us from "false belief, despair and other great and shameful sins"? False belief makes sense as a sin, but why despair?*

*A: There is an important distinction there. False belief is chosen, an active practice that separates us from God.*

Despair is not chosen, but falls on us like a shroud. Many people today might call it clinical depression, although the two are not identical.

Not all sin, however, is chosen or a conscious decision. Most notably, original sin—the inherited sin of Adam and Eve which afflicts all people—is a condition from birth, but it is still sin, which requires God's forgiveness. That is one key reason for baptizing infants. Their actions may be driven purely by instinct, but they are still sinners by nature and in need of salvation.

In the case of those who suffer despair, there is *no* intention, in the Bible or the catechism, somehow to blame them for that dreadful experience. In fact, that part of the *Small Catechism* reads, "We pray...that *the devil, the world, and our sinful nature* may not deceive us or lead us into false belief, despair, and other great and shameful sins." Far from being self-chosen, despair is inflicted on us by God's enemies.

Even so, despair is still a sin, even "a great and shameful one," because it denies God's promise to provide for us and give us a future. It sees no hope—not even from God—for any solution to the present misery and, in that sense, it means rejecting God.

The only solution to despair (beyond medication and/or counseling for those are clinically depressed) is the proclamation of the Gospel, the Word of God that breaks in from the outside and shatters the darkness around us with the promise that God knows us, loves us, has chosen to be our God and gives us an eternal future in Christ. Then, even out of the depths, we can confess with St. Paul, "Neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39) That sure and certain promise is the one, true antidote, the nullification, the lifting of the shroud of despair by the power of the Holy Spirit.



## Imagine Capital Campaign

Plans for a new capital campaign to succeed *Imagine* are underway. The new campaign will be run this fall and extend from 2018-2020. By the end of this year, the remaining balance on the mortgage will be less than \$1.5 million (from a beginning balance of \$3.2 million just seven years ago!) That is about the same amount that the people of Faith Lutheran gave to the WOW campaign ten years ago. If we can match that amount again,

the mortgage will be paid by the time of Faith's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2020. That would be a great way to celebrate a major milestone in our church's life!

## Christian Life Management




## Music Notes

As we prepare to celebrate the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation, we do well to look back on half a millennium of worship in the church. Standing tall among the institutions of this history is the practice of singing hymns—songs that teach objective truth about God and allow us, through their strong melodies and memorable verses, to carry such doctrine easily in our hearts and minds. In the months to come, we will seek to employ hymns more frequently throughout all the functions of the church, from Confirmation to Sunday services and everything in between. The upcoming Compline service (on October 1) will comprise almost entirely hymns, old and new, and our celebration of Reformation Sunday (October 29) will conclude with a hymn festival at Christ the King.

For some, hymns are priceless treasures, while for others, these songs are little more than dusty relics. However, hymns are absolutely not bound to any particular style of worship. They are just as readily accompanied by guitars and drums as they are by organ or solo piano (all of which can be, in my opinion, awesome expressions of praise). What sets a hymn apart is, primarily, a great depth of lyrics and a tune that falls into a specific, poetic meter. Whatever your experience with hymns in the past, I encourage you to stay tuned as we explore them together at Faith.

## “Seniors’ Scene”

### **“Bugenhagen Comes to Copenhagen: The Reformation in Denmark”**

What European countries do you think about when you hear “Reformation”? Most likely Germany, with Wittenberg in the limelight. Or perhaps Rome in Italy. Maybe Switzerland?


How about Denmark? Could any good thing, Reformation-related, come out of Denmark??

Actually, the answer is “Yes.” There was Reformation activity in Denmark, and ultimately it had vibrations relative to Faith Lutheran Church, Hutchinson. While I have no idea what percentage of Faith Lutheran members have Danish backgrounds, I do know we were members of the UELC (United Evangelical Lutheran Church), the Danish synod that later joined the ALC (American Lutheran Church). In our formative years, in other words, we were heavily Danish in our backgrounds. Perhaps, during our **Seniors’ Potluck** meeting on **Thursday, October 26**, some of our older members can share what they remember about this.

Interestingly, my first parish in Hampton, Nebraska, belonged to the UELC. So I recall the *Ansgar Lutheran*, the official synodical monthly periodical, and the Danish name, and relationships. The UELC synod was affectionately referred to as the “Sad Danes,” because of their more restrained (some would say “strict”) approach to their faith. Not far north were some “Happy Danes.” as they were called. They belonged to the AELC (American Evangelical Lutheran Church) and were more social and upbeat in their faith. (By the way, we’ll have a pop quiz on these synods and their names. Or, maybe not; I’d flunk.) In the 1960’s, the UELC joined The ALC (The American Lutheran Church. Official word was that “The” was added before “ALC” to distinguish it from an older ALC. Some of us think it’s just a way to make us even more confused.) The AELC joined the LCA (Lutheran Church in America). Later, both united in the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America).

By the way, we have a display of a little Danish background of our church, namely St. Morton’s (Heatwole) Church. The cemetery remains today and is maintained by volunteers from Faith. You can find the display hanging in the entry way by the office.

Pastor Scott will start things off by speaking about Bugenhagen coming to Denmark to bring the vital Reformation scriptural banners to people in Copenhagen and beyond. It should be a good history lesson to warm our hearts and minds even more as we celebrate 500 years of Reformation blessings, and seek to be a part of the next 500 years in the same spirit.



So we continue to say, ***“Here I Stand...Here We Go!”*** We go, in the name of Jesus!



Here’s a “heads up” about our November meeting. We will be acting out of our Christian faith to prepare Christmas boxes once again---“Operation Christmas Child” boxes—and, also, rolling bandages from old sheets. ## OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD BOXES

As Christians we seek out every possibility to share our faith in Jesus Christ. We know Him as our Savior and our daily Lord of life. He gives freely to insure we have His forgiveness of sin, and He empowers us by His Spirit to live a new life in Him. As we follow Him, we experience peace and assurance every day we live.



But there are many who don't know Jesus. **Operation Christmas Child** is one simple way to introduce people to Jesus. As you send boxes with toys, hygiene items, paper, books and more, you are actually sending the love of God. When children receive their boxes, they are invited to attend a 12-session class that tells them of salvation in Jesus, and a new life of faith. A tally shows most who receive the box do attend the class and 50% come to faith in Jesus.

Can YOU help us? Why not make it a family project to buy items, pack one or several boxes together, and offer prayers for Jesus to shine forth through your **OCC** activity. Sunday school classes, our small Faith Groups, Bible study groups, all may do a box project together.

### HERE'S HOW YOU CAN HELP:

**Pick up a brochure and an OCC box** from the church. As soon as they arrive in the mail we'll distribute them throughout the church building. Brochures give complete information on what items to buy for what ages. Please pack your boxes exactly according to those instructions. **You will need one brochure for each box.** OCC asks that we only use their OCC packing boxes this year. They can not accept shoe boxes or plastic boxes.

If you don't want to pack a box yourself, you can bring items for others to pack at our scheduled packing sessions. Be sure those articles you buy will fit in a shoe box. Bring as much as you wish. We've never had too many.

If you really don't like to buy items or pack boxes, you can still be involved. You can help with shipping costs. It costs **\$9.00 per box** to ship abroad. You may **bring cash to the church office** for as many boxes as you wish to sponsor. OR, you may put \$9.00 in the envelope which is part of the brochure. Or, you may (you don't have to) **make out checks for \$9.00 for each box you pack, payable to "SAMARITAN'S PURSE."**



You have **TWO group box-packing opportunities:** While they take place at two age-level sessions, anyone of any age may participate. They are INTERGENERATIONAL activities. Just show up and we'll get you involved in the fun, as you are able. **HERE ARE THE TWO PACKING TIMES:**

**Wednesday, November 1, from 8:30 - 10:00 a.m.** Schools have a late start that day, so students are invited to come and join the fun. With adult help, they have done extremely well!

**Thursday, November 9,** at Seniors' Potluck. You can join in the potluck dinner at **12:00 noon**, or come at **1:00 p.m.** for just the packing.

\*\*\***DEADLINE** this year is **SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 12.** So please begin planning TODAY. Last year, along with our partners at Fernando, we sent **218 boxes**. Can we top that?

If you buy \$25 in SCRIP, you receive a gift card good for \$25 worth of merchandise or service at the individual retailer of your choice.

The difference between the discounted rate the church pays for the SCRIP and the face value for which the SCRIP is sold to you is profit which will currently be used to help support the Mugs & Muffins and Men of Faith programs.



