Why Music in the Church?

This is a serious question that many people have asked. If someone were to question music in the church setting, on a whole, that would be biblically inaccurate. God calls us to worship with music. Now, the 'real' question that comes into play is "what kind of music?" This is an age old question that never ceases to stir up controversy. Several people have written books, articles, and even created "tests" to determine what is appropriate for music in the church. Author, Ed Stetzer, gives these quotes in his book *Perimeters of Light:*

"Get rid of that flute at church. Trash that trumpet, too. What do you think we are, pagans?"

200s: Instrumental music was almost universally shunned because of its association with debauchery and immorality. Lyre playing, for example, was associated with prostitution.

"Musical solos by ordinary people? I come to worship God, not man!"

600s: The monasteries, referencing "Seven times a day I praise you" (Ps. 119:164), developed a seven-times-daily order of prayer. The services varied in content, but included a certain amount of singing, mainly by a solo singer, with the congregation repeating a refrain at intervals. The services were linked together by their common basis in the biblical psalms in such a way that the whole cycle of 150 psalms was sung every week.

"How arrogant for musicians to think their new songs are better than what we've sung for generations."

900s: Music began to be widely notated for the first time, enabling choirs to sing from music. Thus new types of music could be created which would have been quite out of the reach of traditions where music was passed on by ear.

"It's too loud, and the music drowns out the words."

1400s: Music became increasingly complex (Gothic sounds for Gothic buildings), prompting criticisms that only the choir was allowed to sing. As reformer John Wycliffe had complained, "No one can hear the words, and all the others are dumb and watch them like fools."

"Now they're putting spiritual words to theater songs that everyone knows."

1500s: Martin Luther set about reforming public worship by freeing the mass from what he believed to be rigid forms. One way he did this was by putting stress on congregational singing. He used hymns and music already familiar to the majority of people in Germany.

"Our children will grow up confused, not respecting the Bible as an inspired book."

1700s: Isaac Watts gave a great boost to the controversial

idea of a congregation singing "man-made" hymns, which he created by freely paraphrasing Scripture. Charles Wesley paraphrased the Prayer Book, and versified Christian doctrine and experience. Wesley's songs were said to have had at least as great an influence as his sermons.

"These Christian radio quartets are on a slippery slope. Don't they realize that the airwaves are the domain of Satan, 'prince of the power of the air'?" (Eph. 2:2).

1900s: When radio was in its infancy, a handful of Christian pioneers such as Donald Grey Barnhouse and Charles E. Fuller began featuring gospel music and evangelistic teaching over the airwaves. Many Christians initially showed skepticism.

"Christian Rock is an oxymoron. The music of the world must not invade the church."

1970s: Larry Norman sang, "I want the people to know, That He saved my soul, But I still like to listen to the radio...They say that rock and roll is wrong...I know what's right, I know what's wrong and I don't confuse it: Why should the devil have all the good music...'Cause Jesus is the Rock and He rolled my blues away." Christian rock is not the first controversial form of music in church. As confusing and impossible as this sounds, my definition of what is appropriate for music in church is simple, does the music invite you to worship without distraction? My view was inspired by Bach's. He himself said, "The aim and final reason of all music should be to glorify God and refresh the spirit." Now, I would argue secondly that it is not only the music's role to invite you to worship, but rather, the listener should be preparing their hearts for worship. So, the blame shouldn't just land on the music or musician, but everyone should be aware of what the atmosphere is and what it should be.

Now, why music if it causes so much controversy? Music is an art form that expresses, not represents. While other art forms can do both, music has an advantage that it easily and almost naturally expresses. When music is playing, it is expressing an emotion, not typically representing a physical scene. Even if it is attempting to represent a physical scene, often times it would be more accurate to say it is detailing a reaction to a scene. This is another topic that could be discussed at length, but in short: Music allows us to express our emotions, unaltered by the short comings of pictures and language. These emotions, understandings, etc... are what allow us to praise and honor God. Music then, allows us to express ourselves to God.

Music, in and of itself, is not sacramental. We do not receive Christ, in his true and prescribed form, through music. However, when you add the Word of God, there is this relationship that occurs allowing one to express God's word in a different emotional realm. This, however, is not to say that God's Word is better understood and heard through music, that would be blasphemy, but rather, the union allows us to experience God's Word in a different way; a way that

has a biblical invitation. So, there should be no shame, fear, or regret in worshiping God or realizing God through music.

<u>Giving</u>

Did the title make you want to stop right there thinking here we go, they want more money? If you read the financial update below and see that we have a \$45,000 deficit at the end of July that would be understandable. Do we need your financial support? As stated in The Book of Malachi 3:10 "I am the Lord All-Powerful, and I challenge you to put me to the test. Bring the entire ten percent into the storehouse, so there will be food in my house. Q. What about re-baptism?

A: It's happened a couple of times. Someone will go off to college and then excitedly get a hold of me to tell me the big news: they were re-baptized! The news is always delivered with the expectation that I would be excited, thankful, and even relieved. It was a sign of their commitment, the authenticity of their faith, that they were finally owning their faith in Jesus.

It makes me want to smack my head on my desk!

Am I overreacting? Maybe, but let me explain. It goes right to the center of our understanding of baptism (and faith in general). Who is doing the work? Is baptism a work that we are doing to validate faith or is it a work that God is doing to give faith? As Lutherans, we believe the later. God is at work in baptism! It's not about us having finally figured it out and declaring to the world that we are now righteous. Instead, it's about God, coming to a clueless and lost sinner, and, in the words of the Small Catechism, baptism "works forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this."

To go even further, to be re-baptized is just further indication of our sinful nature. It is consistent with our desire to have control, to make it about us, to point to our self-righteousness. Baptism becomes a work that we do to try and justify ourselves. So, in a sense, the pastoral response to someone who boasts about re-baptism is absolution! "You don't believe God's work in your first baptism was valid, that you had to add to it? I declare to you the forgiveness of your sins, in Jesus' name!"

The reason we can bank on our baptism, and cling to it, is that it comes from God and we can take God at his word. Don't try to add to it. *Instead, believe it, cling to it, and live in it!*
