Session 1 "The Reliability of the Resurrection"

"Jesus Will Be Coming Back on January 7th!"

By Rachel Kamrath (Based on II Peter 3:8-13, Matthew 24:36-44, I Corinthians15:23-27a, Revelation 22:16-17)

After reading the verses that "no one knows…only the Father" about when Jesus will return (from Matthew 24: 36-44), I remember making predictions aloud as a kid about when he would come back. My kid logic was sound …if I "know" Jesus will come back on a certain day…then He cannot possibly come that day! I wanted to have my birthday party and presents, so by declaring that Jesus would return on my birthday, I thought I could delay His coming and celebrate as scheduled. Unfortunately, that's not how it works. We can't trick the creator of the universe into changing His master plan. But we can be sure He will return according to his word…and on His own schedule.

Dear God--We are so thankful for your faithfulness to your word that you will return. Thank you for providing a way for us to spend eternity with you through Jesus' death on the cross. Give us wisdom to know how to reach other people in your name, that they might also have eternal life with you someday. Give us patience, diligence, and trust in You until your return. In Jesus name, Amen.

"Witnessing the Truth"

Those who have witnessed (albeit secondhand) any of the disasters of the past such as, John F. Kennedy's assassination, the Space Shuttle Challenger explosion, or the Twin Towers, Pentagon and Flight #93 terrorist attacks would have varying reports of the incident—all depending upon their perspective. In modern society, that standpoint would be which television channel they were viewing at the time of the incident. Because we saw with our own eyes, we know it to be true!

Lacking the recording cameras or cell phones 2000+ years ago, we have only the recounting of the resurrection of our Lord as told by the four Gospel writers. These Gospels were written independently of one another, with each writer reporting on what he knew to be true.

Thus, we have Matthew telling about Mary Magdelene and the other Mary visiting the empty tomb, while Luke adds Joanna and several others to the mix. John's version emphasizes Mary Magdelene as the sole witness to the risen Savior. One thing is certain, however: the tomb was empty, and all the disciples except Judas Iscariot would eventually see and hear the resurrected Lord.

I invite you to read and meditate on the resurrection accounts in each of the four Gospels, personally realizing that Jesus rose from the dead and lives with you today. As you grow in your relationship with Christ, he will give you both the opportunities and inner strength to tell his message.

Gracious Lord, you have been forever faithful in fulfilling your promises. I believe that you have saved me through the cross of Christ and his glorious resurrection. Keep me faithful to your word and help me witness to others of your everlasting love and goodness. Amen.

"The Reliability of the Faith"

"The Scriptures are Reliable"

(Based on John 1:1-14; II Timothy 3:16, and Romans 10:5-17)

Who or what can you trust these days? If you turn on the news or click on social media, you are bombarded with stories and opinions that claim to be factual and true. But are they? In the same way, you might find yourself asking if we can trust Christianity's greatest treasure—the Bible—the Word of God.

My answer is that yes, we can trust the Bible. It is reliable. First is its divine inspiration. Most of the Biblical authors from Moses to Paul claimed to be inspired by God in what they said and wrote (II Timothy 3:16, II Peter 1:20-21, II Samuel 23:2). Next is its indestructibility. Though many enemies throughout history have tried to destroy it, the Bible remains the world's best-selling book with billions of copies sold. Then, though the Bible was written over a period of approximately 1,600 years by approximately 40 authors in too major languages, it still shows a consistent view of life and set of truths. The question of which books to include in the Bible was debated by many councils. notably a council led by Athanasius in AD 367. Athanasius used several specific criteria to decide which books should be included in the Biblical canon: were they authoritative, prophetic, authentic, dynamic, and accepted and used by believers? There have been many other histories written of famous men and nations, but the Bible has more factual support, a shorter time period between origins and surviving copies, and more surviving manuscripts than any other ancient document.

We can also order our lives by that Word. Paul tells us that the Word is useful for teaching, reproof, for correction and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. (II Timothy 3:16-17). Jesus also prayed for his disciples before he died, "Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth." (John 17:17).

Heavenly Father, keep us steadfast in your Word. Help us to turn to it for answers to our questions, direction for our lives, reminders of your precious promises and peace for our hearts.

"The Gift of Wisdom"

The Lord gives wisdom to those who seek it. If we grasp and contemplate this incredible gift of wisdom, we wrestle in our minds the weight of this knowledge – maybe even too much at times.
