

"Impossible is nothing."



IMPOSSIBLE

Its meaning is clear. The only limitations we have are those we perceive. If we work hard, if we think bigger, if we reach for the stars, those limitations disappear. Nothing is impossible! Impossible is nothing.

As Ali once famously declared, "Impossible is just a big word thrown around by small men who find it easier to live in the world they've been given than to explore the power they have to change it. Impossible is not a fact. It's an opinion. Impossible is not a declaration. It's a dare. Impossible is potential. Impossible is temporary. Impossible is nothing."

It sounds good. It makes for a good quote or meme. It might even inspire me to do an extra set of push-ups (nah), but the fact is: it isn't true. Impossible is *not* nothing.

Impossible is something.

We live in a finite world, and we are finite creatures. We have limitations. We have boundaries. I just watched a movie in which the hero climbed a rope (twice) to get into a helicopter, got into a bruising fist-fight with a massive bad guy--at a high elevation, no less--and then scaled a 20-foot cliff in 20 seconds to disarm a nuclear bomb. No wonder why the movie was called Mission Impossible! And while the movie hero accomplished all of these things, the realist in me thought, "There's no way he could physically be able to do that!" There are limits!

And there are even more daunting limits than ropes and cliffs. Think you can cast out demons? Think you can conquer death? Think you can earn your way to salvation? Think again. No amount of striving, or straining, or pushing, or discipline is going to help you. It is impossible. You've met your match. Impossible is something.

Unless you're God.

"For man it is impossible, but not with God," Jesus said in Mark 10:27.

"For all things are possible with God." For God, impossible truly is nothing.

Q: What do people mean when they talk about "prophecy" in the Bible?

A: Among Christians, the term prophecy is used in two different ways that are only slightly related and it causes some confusion. The original meaning of the word is the messages from God that the prophets delivered to Israel and the early church.

They addressed the people in their current situation, often warning them to repent of their sin, while assuring them of God's steadfast love, despite their sin.

In doing so, however, many prophecies also included promises of what God would do in the future. Because of that, "prophecy" came to be equated with "prediction," as if its main or only purpose was to predict the future. Outside of the church, prophecy is used almost exclusively today to mean predicting the future, even though that was not the prophets' main job.

That led to the other use of prophecy, which has become very common today. People who try to "de-code" the book of *Revelation* and other apocalyptic passages in the Bible in order to predict how the world will end and when Christ will return often describe their teaching as "prophecy." Such efforts, though, have little to do with the original prophecy inspired by God.

In fact, trying to predict the future on the basis of certain Bible texts is a futile task, because Jesus himself told us that not even he knew when that would be. "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father." (Matt. 24:36). It is also a misuse of those apocalyptic texts, which were not written as a "secret code" to the future, but to promise that God will finally save His people. It also leads to endless analysis of obscure Bible texts, rather than clear proclamation of the Gospel. I think we do well to pay lots of attention to Biblical prophecy and very little to what goes by the name of "prophecy" today.

While we're at it, here is another source of confusion. The messages the prophets declared are called *prophecy* (with a -c- and pronounced *prof-eh-see*). The act of speaking those messages was to *prophesy* (with an -s- and pronounced *prof-eh-sigh*). Watch out for the -c- (the noun) or the -s- (the verb) and you will know which pronunciation to use!







"You Still Have Rice, But Soon No Way to Cook It." One of Many Dilemmas for our New Hope Mission Society Partners Facing Devastating Floods

The picture gives you the big picture. Dr. Abdul, his father, Pastor K.K. Alavi, and their team at Bishara have been working tirelessly to try to alleviate a small portion of the damage done by the massive flooding. It is the worst monsoon season in

memory, causing untold destruction of homes but also the loss of a great many lives.

Abdul shares that "we are engaged in providing packaged water, blankets, food, clothes and medications to these people, along with government and other missions seeking to respond. The episode is persisting with tragic consequences.

Bishara itself has been spared with very little physical destruction. The Bible College continues to function, with teachers and students residing on campus on higher ground.

Abdul has recently reported, however, to Dorothy Desens, President of NHMS, that while Bishara still has basic rice for food, it still faces an impending crisis. To save money, the Center has relied on burning wood to cook the rice, but now dry wood is no longer available. When the current propane gas runs out, there is no more available to obtain in the area. It is hard for us to imagine facing such a dilemma.

Faith's Church in the World ministry team and Church Council are supporting a simple invitation for

anyone wishing to respond with a financial gift to direct that to our mission partner, the New Hope Mission Society. Please mark your gift for "Flood Relief." If placed in the Sunday morning offering, it will be directed to leaders of NHMS.
