

Pastor's Page

Another campaign cycle is in full swing, with all the familiar elements. Television and internet ads are everywhere. Polls are released every day, with conflicting results. The pundits keep churning out columns and commentaries that claim to know more than can actually be known at this point. And many of us can hardly wait for election day so that another silly season can be put to rest!

It seems to me, however, that something has changed in the political atmosphere. While people have always taken politics and elections seriously, I feel as if more people have come to see them as matters of ultimate significance. That is, people now ascribe to politics the weight that was once attached to religion and today's much-lamented polarization has a religious fervor to it. Elections are described in apocalyptic terms, as if the future of the world or people's eternal fate depends on which party controls Congress or who occupies the White House. Given the constant reports about the decline of Christianity in our country, I have to wonder if this elevation of political issues to a quasi-religious status signals that, for some people, it has become an object of faith and worship taking God's place.

None of this is to say that political questions and decisions are unimportant. Quite the opposite, being able to discuss politics freely and to elect our own leaders are treasured rights that lie at the heart of the whole American experiment. At the same time, though, our Christian faith provides a much-needed reminder that nothing in this world, no matter how important it might be, is *ultimately* important.

One of Martin Luther's great insights was his view of the Two Kingdoms or two ways that God reigns over creation. He labeled the Church as God's Right-hand Kingdom. There, God works directly and openly through Word and the sacraments to deliver people from sin, death and the devil. What Luther called God's Left-hand Kingdom is the world—family, community, work, school and government. Here, God works indirectly through structures, institutions and authorities, but, although God's rule is less obvious here, the key point is that He reigns over *both* kingdoms, that is, over all of creation.

Of these two ways God reigns over creation, only the Church deals with ultimate matters of salvation and eternal life. In the Left-hand Kingdom, God sustains life, provides nurturing relationships and equips us to care for each other and the earth, but those gifts cannot provide the saving gifts that all people need the most—forgiveness of sins and reconciliation with God in Christ.

Because of that, it is vital not to mix or confuse the kingdoms. If the Church tries to run the world or the world tries to serve as Church, it causes nothing but trouble. Instead, Christians are called to live out their vocations as citizens, spouses, parents, neighbors (and many others) in the Left-hand Kingdom, pursuing God's will for the world as it is revealed to us in the Right-hand Kingdom.

As Christians, we surely should not avoid political matters, but we dare not idolize them, either. So, go at with your neighbor on the other side of the aisle—and then close by praying together for the nation. Vote for the leaders you believe are best, but pray for God to guide whoever is elected. Place your faith and hope in Christ alone, and strive to serve your family and neighbors with the love with which Christ first loved us. Involve yourself in all the matters of the Left-hand Kingdom, but as you do, know that whatever may happen there, it cannot threaten, replace or compete with the reign of the risen Christ Jesus in the eternal, ultimate Kingdom of God.



Q: I don't have to go to church to be a Christian, do I?

A: I have been asked versions of this question several times through the years. A few people have not asked, but simply declared that there is no necessary connection between the two.

The answer, of course, is no—if you are serving in the military or live in a nursing home or have been jailed, or simply cannot attend for some other reason. Our coming to church does not secure our salvation, nor is the Holy Spirit unable to reach people wherever they may be.

If one turns the question around, though, and asks, "What do Christians do?" the main answer has always been that they gather regularly for worship services. It started in Acts 2:41-42, when the first Christians gathered for the first service on the evening of Pentecost Sunday, the first day of the Church's life. So, to claim to be a Christian, while hoping to avoid the main activity that Christians have done from day one doesn't quite fit. It suggests something is out of whack.

That something may be a deeper issue here. The question assumes that going to church is a duty, a hoop to jump through in order to get a gold star on that big attendance chart in the sky. If people think worship is religious busywork, it is little wonder that they might avoid it.

The truth is that we do not come to worship to please God. God calls us to worship for our sake, to do his saving work in us, again and again. It is not a matter of duty, but of relationship, spending time with and receiving the benefits of God our Father and Christ our Savior. It is not an obligation to be avoided, but an opportunity not to be missed!

One of my seminary professors used this illustration. Whenever people asked if they had to do something as a Christian, it reminded him of a groom on his wedding night, looking at his beloved waiting in the marriage bed and asking, "Do I have to do something?" And then my professor responded, "What's the matter? Don't you *want* to?"

The New Testament uses the image of Christ as the Bridegroom and the Church as his bride. It is a relationship of love and joy, but also one of forgiveness and reconciliation. It is the greatest "love affair" in all of reality. So, no, you don't *have* to go to church to luxuriate in Christ's loving presence, but my goodness, why in the world would you not *want* to?!?


