I remember preaching a sermon a few years ago in which I declared, "I hate

giving!" First of all, many of us live pretty tight. We're paycheck to paycheck. In fact, many financial advisors say that most Americans are just a few paychecks away from bankruptcy! So we need money! Mortgage payments are relentless and burdensome. We have to own a couple of vehicles, which inevitably break down. Cell phone bills are ridiculous—and, of course, our third grader needs a smart phone, too! Who has time to cook these days!? So fast food and restaurant costs add up. Throw in braces for the kids, a medical emergency, and at least a little entertainment and who has extra money to give!? I hate giving.

But, I need to give. I have a deep need in me to give. Oh sure, I resist this need all the time, but it's there. I need to give precisely because I don't want to give. I need to give because I hold onto my money too tightly. I need to give because I too often put myself and my needs before others. I need to give because I love money too much. I'm like the rich young ruler we talked about in worship a few weeks ago. Like him, I idolize my wealth and possessions. I don't want to be parted from them. They come between me and Jesus. So I need to give.

And so, thankfully, I've come to the point where I love to give. Don't get me wrong, I'm not Mother Theresa. I still often get a little tight-fisted and selfish. But Andrea and I practice tithing. We give the first 10% of our income to the church. And then we support other causes or charities on top of that. Could that money be helpful in other areas of my life? Maybe. But can that money be better spent? Nope. It's going right where it needs to go.

I don't share this to toot my own horn, but to express the freedom that comes with

giving. A great truth that I've experienced is that you can't out-give God! God

loves giving! He gives us this day our daily bread. He gives us the very breath we breathe. He gave his only Son to die for us.

Finally, Faith needs your giving. As the end of the year approaches, we have a steeper hill to climb than in years past. Once again, we are counting on the family of Faith to come through, to give generously, to finish strong.

So give! Give generously! Give cheerfully! For "God loves a cheerful giver!" (II Cor. 9:7)

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


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
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


"Faith Seeks Understanding" Learning Opportunities for Adults

Q: Lutherans don't recognize sainthood, so why do we celebrate All Saints' Day?

A: Martin Luther's rediscovery of the Gospel ruled out the whole idea that some Christians do so much good that they earn the special status of sainthood. The Bible proclaims that in Holy Baptism we die with Christ and

are raised to new life in him. (Romans 6:1-11) The Christian life does not consist of earning credit with God. Sinners could never do that and Christians no longer need it. Instead, it is the living out of our new identity in Christ for the sake of our neighbors. As Luther once wrote, "God does not need your good works, but your neighbor does."

In his letters, however, Paul used "saints" in a different sense. For example, his address to the Corinthian church reads, "To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints..." We know from the letter that follows that the Corinthian church was riddled with conflict, cliques and false teaching. The members of it fell far short of what is normally considered saintly behavior.

So why did Paul refer to them as saints? It was not because of their conduct, but because they had been claimed by Christ. They were *sanctified*, that is, *made* holy by God's grace in Jesus Christ. Their sainthood was not an achievement, but a gift. It was based not on their actions, but their identity in Christ. It did not reflect their own nature, but Christ's saving work within them.

That is what we celebrate on All Saints' Day. We are not singling out Christians of exceptional merit, but we thank God for all those who have gone before us, passed on the faith to us and provided us a model of what it means to live by faith in Christ alone. We also acknowledge those in our family of Faith who died in the past year, as well as those who were baptized into Christ. They, with us, are all the members of Christ's family who have been "sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints."

Upon This Rock

Last year, Faith Lutheran was blessed to receive a large bequest from the estate of Delores Saar. At a special meeting in June, the congregation voted to apply most of that gift to the principal balance on the mortgage. That extra payment dropped the remaining debt below \$1 million dollars and the payoff date is now 13 years earlier than the original loan!

All of that extra payment, however, came off the *back end* of the loan. The church still has a required payment every month and we depend on continuing gifts to *Upon This Rock* to make each one.

Unfortunately, gifts to UTR have dropped sharply in the last few months. That has made a worrisome dent in the reserve funds we hold to make sure the church is able to make each month's payment.

Please give regularly to *Upon This Rock* in light of how God has first blessed you, so that the church can avoid any kind of debt crisis, and instead keep making amazing progress on retiring the mortgage, perhaps even by the 150th anniversary of the church in 2020!

Our Lord Declares: "...As you did it unto one of the least of these, who are members of My family, you did it unto me." Matthew 25: 40



This year, as in past years, we invite one another not only to reach our minimum goal of \$5,000 in this appeal, but to give freely to go well beyond this goal.

We once again will work with trusted partners locally, nationally, and internationally to see that people who face the need for food will be fed. It is important that the funds we give go not to administration but to meet the actual needs of hungry children of God.

In 2018, the Church in the World Team proposes the following disbursement of funds given:

40% to Common Cup Ministries in Hutchinson and McLeod County
40% through NHMS to help our Southern India partners feed
desperately poor community members devastated by the recent
flood and extreme poverty. (See picture to right)

20% to assist trusted partners in addressing the hunger needs related to recent devastating hurricanes in this country. *Mark your gift for the FLC November Hunger Appeal*
