### Pastor's Page

One really bright spot at Faith Lutheran over the last decade has been a dramatic improvement in her financial health. Ten years ago, we were running large deficits in the General Fund and accumulating more operating debt each year. Since then, however, Faith has paid off all that operating debt and the church council even decided recently to close a line of credit with the bank, because we had not used it in years!

That is great news, but there is also some not-so-good news. This financial turnaround has depended almost entirely on massive year-end giving. Nearly 40% of Faith's General Fund offerings come in the last three months of the year—and nearly 30% in just the last two! These late giving surges have enabled the church to start each new year with a cash cushion which has been essential to avoid borrowing funds to cover her expenses during the first nine months.

The problem is that giving during those first nine months falls far short of expenses—but we can't wait until December to pay those obligations. So far in 2019, General Fund offerings are \$100,000 below expenses—even though the annual budget has remained nearly flat for several years. We pray that year-end giving will cover that deficit again this year. If it does not, the church will face a major financial crisis. For as much of a blessing as huge year-end offerings are, Faith is much too reliant on them and that poses a serious risk to the congregation.

Meanwhile, giving for January through September has also remained flat for several years. In fact, in 2019 it is slightly below 2018 at the same point. That suggests, at least, that, rather than adjusting their giving each year according to their income, Faith's members are giving at the same rate each year—and then giving more at year's end depending on how big the church's deficit is.

Again, those year-end gifts are invaluable and deeply appreciated, but this giving *pattern* is not healthful, nor does it reflect sound Biblical stewardship teaching. The Bible calls us to give according to how God first blesses us, not according to how big a hole there may be in the church budget. We are called to give a percentage of our income, before other expenses, as an expression of trust in God's promise to provide for us.

In fact, trusting God to provide for us makes stewardship a vital spiritual discipline. Money can exercise immense power over us, whether we are wealthy, just scraping by or anywhere in-between. Giving a percentage of our money away is an ongoing reminder that it is a tool God gives to us, not the basis of our security. Stewardship teachers have often said that Christians do not only give to needs, but we have a need to give, in order to strengthen our faith.

Spread out your giving more evenly through the year, trusting God to keep providing for you. Help put Faith Lutheran on a more solid financial footing, so that this ministry God has entrusted to us will be reliably funded all year long.

*Q: Was Jesus ever a “teenage boy”?*

A: This question was submitted by a group of teenage boys which makes me wonder what all they meant by a “teenage boy”! The quotation marks point more to typical—and not always positive—teenage behavior than simply to physical development, and that makes the question very interesting.

Since Jesus was fully human, he obviously passed through his teenage years with all the issues that period of rapid development typically brings. However, since Jesus was also without sin, it raises the question of whether, and how, he avoided the kind of hijinks in which teenage boys often engage.

Interestingly, the one and only account of Jesus’ childhood in the Bible, his visit to Jerusalem with his parents in Luke 2:41-51, suggests how God led Jesus through those tumultuous years. During that visit, Jesus wandered off from his parents and caused them tremendous anxiety before they found him. But the reason he had lost track of time and his parents was that he was hungrily learning about his heavenly Father from the teachers in the temple. So, Jesus showed a lack of responsible awareness as teenagers often can, but he did so out of utterly faithful reasons, not disobedient or careless ones. In fact, Luke ends that passage by noting, “Then he went down with them (Joseph and Mary) and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them.”

So, was Jesus ever a teenage boy? Absolutely! But was he ever a “teenage boy”? No, because God the Father equipped him for faithful obedience and protected him through his growing years, until he became fully aware of his divine identity and mission

### Upon This Rock Capital Campaign

The capital campaigns Faith Lutheran has run, including Upon This Rock, have received wonderfully steady support through the years, but each month's offerings are not always enough to cover the mortgage payment. So, the church has held some funds in reserve to make up any difference between the gifts received and the payment required to make sure we can make each month's payment.



As the mortgage has been paid down, we have reduced the amount in reserve and applied the funds to the loan balance. The amount currently in reserve would only cover a couple of months' payments, so the congregation's ongoing support for Upon This Rock is vital.

By now, Faith is reducing the loan balance by \$18,000 every month. At our current rate of payment, the loan will be finished in mid-2021. It would not take that much more effort to finish it off in late 2020, as the capstone to Faith's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Can we reach that goal?


**Why does Faith Lutheran Give Leadership to Witness through NHMS?  
Take in This Inspiring Word from the Administrator of the Shaliach's Bible College  
(Report from Dr. Abdul Messiah)**

Most of our students come from Northeast India that borders Bangladesh and Bhutan, and Northwest India which borders Pakistan. These bordering areas are unreached for Christ. There are about 30 house churches along those borders that we are in contact, and their members are working among some of the most challenging communities. Our students after graduation will work with the pastors to impart training, encouragement, and guidance. It is anticipated that our students will increase the number of house churches, strengthen new believers, and equip them to reach out to their neighbors. Despite great personal risk, as many as 50 pastors are presently engaged in evangelism and church planting near the borders where there is a high percentage of Muslims. The pastors in these locations have approached Shaliach's Bible College to train their young men and women to reach the Muslim homes. Most of the students are referred to the Shaliach's Bible College by the pastors of the house churches.

We at Bishara and the Shaliach's Bible College train our students to work among the Muslims to invite people to become disciples of Jesus Christ and to proclaim, through both word and deed, God's reign of justice, peace and abundant life for all creation. With the present central government policies, it is becoming difficult for Christians all over India. It's not that India lacks laws that guarantee religious freedom. In fact, settled precedent says that house churches do not need permission from the government to operate. Unfortunately, it is the implementation of that law that matters and those implementing the law have already shown their willingness to side with local Hindu radicals against Christians.


