

"It's the most wonderful time of the year"—or, at least, it used to be. In 2020, however, what with countless events being cancelled, many people avoiding church services, and corona virus restrictions casting doubt even on families gathering together, it may already feel as if Advent and Christmas will be a huge letdown. The fact that this often actually *is* "the most wonderful time of the year" makes all the constrictions on Christmas even more of a disappointment than all the other events we have missed throughout this benighted year.

Is it possible, though, that having much of our usual celebrating stripped away could prove to be a blessing in disguise, maybe even a cause of renewal? At least since Clement Moore wrote "Twas the Night before Christmas" and Charles Dickens published A Christmas Carol, the actual event of Christmas, the Incarnation of God's Son in Jesus, has been increasingly covered over with layers of sentimentality, unrealistic expectations for the season, and a mercenary concern to purchase lots of gifts that are all supposed to be "perfect." The traditions of Christmas have overwhelmed Christmas itself to the point that, in our increasingly secular and materialistic culture, one can look far and wide among our "Christmas"

celebrations and find not a mention of Jesus' birth anywhere.

The irony of that is stark and troubling in light of the two accounts of Christmas in Matthew and Luke. They emphasize the humble surroundings of Jesus' birth, his parents' poverty, and the quiet solitude in which he was born. As is so often the case in the Bible and the Church, God worked the miracle of Christmas under the sign of the opposite. The Incarnation had earth-shaking significance, but it was disguised in an ordinary birth in a little village, an event that would have gone entirely unnoticed had not the angel chorus announced it to shepherds, who were themselves among the humblest and most despised members of that society.

Jesus' birth defied all normal expectations for such a momentous event, just as Jesus' ministry rejected all worldly categories of power, influence and status. The most powerful king ever to reign, he who was Savior, Messiah and Lord, had only a cross-shaped throne of rough-hewn wood, while his subjects either ridiculed him or despaired for him—even as he was securing their salvation from sin, death and damnation.

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So perhaps 2020 is the year, since our hands have been forced anyway, to strip away some of those layers of celebration that can come to obscure the actual, historical event of Christmas. This may be the year to focus intentionally on the theological wonder of that simple, but oh-so-profound birth in Bethlehem. This otherwise disappointing year may just be the perfect time simply to gather around that crude manger, look with awe at that entirely ordinary baby who held divinity within him, and pray together the words of that great old hymn:

Thou didst leave thy throne and thy kingly crown
When thou camest to earth for me,
But in Bethlehem's home was there found no room
For thy holy nativity:
O come to my heart, Lord Jesus;
There is room in my heart for thee.

Q: Is the Covid-19 pandemic a sign of God's judgment against us?

A: The only appropriate answer to that question is "only God knows." Although people are understandably curious about God's actions and motives in a time like this, Christians can only be certain of what God *has* revealed to us, not what He has *not* revealed to us. The Bible testifies that God can use nature as

an instrument of judgment, as well as of blessing, but we also know a great deal about how nature works, not to mention the way that sinful human beings can cause or exacerbate different kinds of disasters. Especially with all the uncertainty surrounding this virus, only God knows its origins and purpose.

At the same time, however, the prophet Joel interpreted what was clearly a natural phenomenon, an invasion of locusts, as a call for the Jewish people to repent of their sin and turn back to the Lord. That remains a highly appropriate response to any kind of disaster. Whether or not God directly causes such events, they all remind us of our mortality, drive home that we are creatures and not the Creator, and bring to light our pride, sinful trust in ourselves, and neglect of God's will.

Disasters of all kinds provide a powerful motivation to repent and plead for God's mercy. That is the best response to the Covid-19 pandemic, as well. Whether it has come directly from God's hand, arose from a broken creation or resulted from human malice, it is a perfect reason to respond to God's call through Joel: "Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; tear your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing." *Joel 2:12-13*

Through most of 2020, the family of Faith supported the church's ministry with such amazing generosity that it seemed that we had "changed the pattern" of running up huge deficits during the year and relying on huge offerings in November and December. Almost as soon as we shared that good news, however, the old pattern made a comeback. In September and October, offerings were substantially lower than in those months last year. So, we have opened up a TO THE WORLD! deficit in the General Fund. The good news is that it is not as large as in past years, but the church will need about \$140,000 by year's end to break even. (That

is a big number, but it took \$227,000 to close the gap last year, so this should be well within our reach.) Reflections from Pastor Paul Knudson

When it comes to the Academy Awards given out each year, I dare say most attention is given not to the supporting role but to the lead actor and actress categories. Yet, if the truth be told, supportive roles are crucial for a movie's impact on the audience.

If this is so in the movie world, it is possibly even more important in the world of global witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ. Once northern European and American missionaries played the lead roles in that witness in faraway places like India, Ethiopia, and Madagascar. In the last fifty or more years, the scene has dramatically changed and for the better. Christian expansion in these and other countries has dramatically grown since indigenous people took over the lead roles. If you can speak rightly of stats in witness, they would win the awards.

Sometimes I hear from people who see these outcomes of millions being added to Christian communities of faith since native people have led the way as indicating that our support and leadership are no longer needed. We can keep our focus and resources closer to home. They can handle the witness there just fine without us.

For me, this totally disregards factors on the ground in those far off places. Today, civil wars, extreme poverty, and now suffering and death from the Covid-19 pandemic place tremendous strains on those seeking to be faithful in witness to Jesus Christ. They cry out for our prayers and ongoing financial support. May our Lord move us to give both to our partners in mission.
