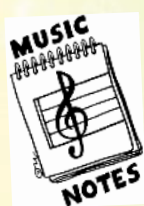
Q: God made us because He wanted to be loved, cared for and glorified. Do you think God is selfish?

A: This perceptive question from a confirmation student is trying to discern the basic relationship between God and His creatures. The premise of the question, however, has it backward. The accounts of creation in Genesis include no motivation for *why* God created the world or made people in His image. Genesis 1:1 states matter-of-factly, “In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth...” God simply chose to create for reasons that are not revealed to us.

On the other hand, because God did choose to create us, we owe it to God to love, care for and glorify Him. It is not a matter of God’s motivation, but our identity. Creatures, by definition, owe everything to their Creator.

Tragically, that is where selfishness actually comes into the story. In Genesis 3, Adam and Eve, despite having everything needed for life, including a face-to-face relationship with God, were lured by the serpent’s false promise that they could have *more*. “God knows that when you eat of (the forbidden fruit) your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.” Humanity’s sinful refusal to love, care for and glorify God in simple trust based on His gift of life is the root of the human condition and all the evil in the world.

In contrast, God proved to be divinely *unselfish*, above all in the events of Christmas we just celebrated. Rather than lashing out in anger to destroy His faithless creatures, God sent His Son to become one of us, to suffer and die in our stead, and raised him from the dead in order to forgive our sin and restore us to right relationship with Him. It is only by God’s grace, renewed in us each day by the Holy Spirit, that we are freed from our sinful selfishness so that we can, as we should, love, care for and glorify God, our Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier.



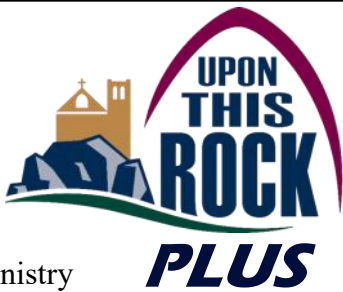
As we say goodbye to 2020 and make our New Year’s Resolutions, I have a few of my own that I wanted to share with the whole Faith family. First, let us emerge from the cloudiness and chaos of this past year with a new song of hope and resilience in our hearts. I believe that we can confidently go forth knowing that no matter what troubles our world, nothing will silence the voice of God. We have heard him singing through the sounds of our reborn Ringers of Faith bell-choir, his whisper in the silence of our candle-lit Christmas services, and his laughter in conversations with friends we have not seen in months. Christian Leadership Sometimes Calls for Harsh Actions in Places like Ethiopia

Reflections from Pastor Paul

There is an old saying: “Power corrupts, and absolute power corrupts absolutely.” For many, many years a power group in the north of Ethiopia, the region of Tigray, held overwhelming power over the rest of the country to the benefit of the few. Finally, people had had enough and voted in a new government led by a Christian Prime Minister.

For the first years of his administration, he sought to be a reconciler and peacemaker. He helped tribal groups to trust one another more and reconciled Ethiopia with a former region of the country that broke away some years previously. He bent over backwards to work with the former government power group, but they only sought to undermine him and promulgate division and fire up former tribal rivalries. They worked under the radar with extremist groups.

Finally, he was led to see that this corrupt cabal had no interest in seeking peace and justice. He called on the military to confront them, force their submission to the rule of law and stop their insurrection. Major progress has been made, but he has had to face international pressure to back down.

In face of this, the more than eight million people of the Ethiopia Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus, the national body and its regional leadership, have supported his efforts to bring a lasting peace to this now troubled land. Partners with whom we work express full support for his efforts.

Evil is a reality in this world. When alternatives to military efforts can still be an option, this is desirable. There come times, however, when leadership is hard and needs to be firm.

Your prayers are invited for this war torn country and for the displaced refugees caught in the middle. This is just one example of mission partners facing life and death challenges continuously.

Our Partners in Feeding the Hungry Are Thankful for Your Generosity

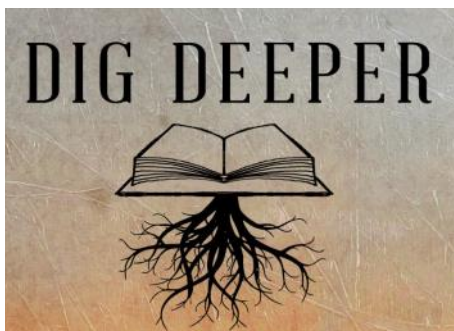
In troubled times, once again FLC members have come through with a marvelous response to our November Hunger Appeal. Through December 9, \$7,300 was given to our partners. Half will go to our partners in India supported by NHMS, 35% will go to providers of food to the needy (primarily through Common Cup), and 15% will be given to feed the hungry in prisons in Madagascar through our partner, Friends of Madagascar Mission. Developing the Spiritual Life of Children

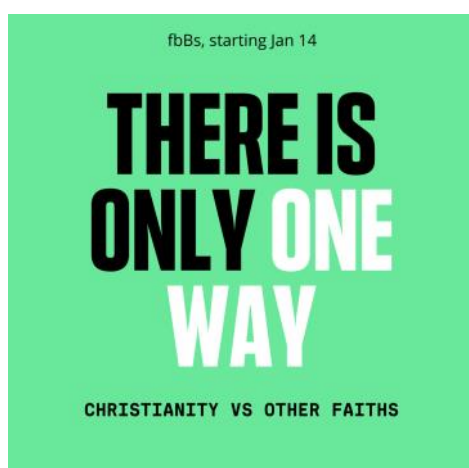
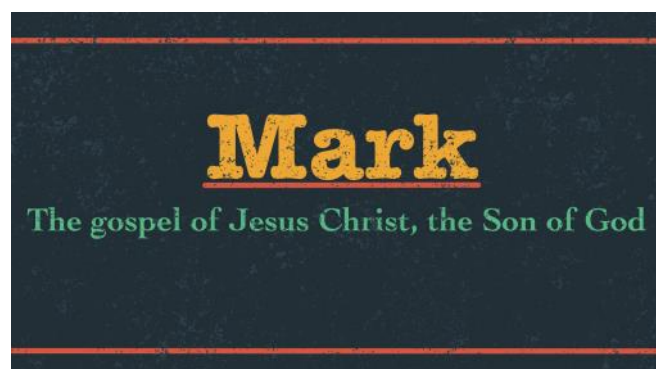
Biblical advice on how to pass on our faith to the next generation.

There isn't much question but that each of us need to learn some new ways to reckon with the separation, disconnectedness and even isolation for some during this pandemic. Many of you have shared some unique and productive ways in which you successfully chase the boredom from your days.



Let me share a few ideas that I've come across. I hope you might be helped, if you need it. Let me know if you personally adapt some of the suggestions.

Some elders have the internet/computers to go to. Many of you tell of Facebook, e-mails, and Face Time calls with your loved ones who are miles away. How wonderful is that! For you who do not have or like computers there is a program that just might interest you. It's called "**Well Connected.**" It's a program that uses telephones, not computers. That may well be more to your liking.

Here's how it works:

Participants (or people interested and wondering if this is for them) call this number: **(877) 797-7299**, toll free.

Someone will answer and tell you how the program works. Essentially, here is how it goes:

- You can join a group of no more than 12 people to talk with.
- A leader guides the conversation.
- You do not need to talk unless you are comfortable doing so. Listening is in.
- --There is no charge.
- You can choose from a vast variety of subjects the group focusses on, like:

Music	Inspiring stories	Where were you when...?
Stories and Prayers	Pets	Humor (jokes)
Trivia Sundays	Bird watching	Get support
Share a gratitude	Play games	Write poetry
Learn a language	Meditation	Go on a virtual tour

The subject is not as important as just having a chance to connect meaningfully with other people in the same boat and feel refreshed by sharing with people you will never see.

If this sounds like something helpful FOR YOU, please give it a try. If you do, let me know how it is going.

WAYS TO HELP EACH OTHER during these pandemic days and months:

- ♦ Call 1 person on a regular basis (daily, weekly—you decide). Be an open-hearted listener. Don't try to fix their problems; just "*give them an ear.*"
- ♦ Send occasional notes/ cards with words of comfort from YOU. They may arrive at a time when strength through someone else is sorely needed.
- ♦ If possible, offer to give concrete help, such as running to the library, grocery store, etc.
- ♦ If possible, call and say: "*Don't worry about dinner. I'm bringing it over at 6:00 p.m.*" Nothing fancy. Just a nice gift from YOU.
- ♦ Offer to read a Bible verse/passage for them over the phone. Talk about what you like about the reading. You can pray a simple prayer if you wish; perhaps about things from your conversation.
- ♦ Share a short devotion from materials you use for yourself.
- ♦ YOUR IDEAS? Share them with us!

GRIEF SUPPORT GROUP

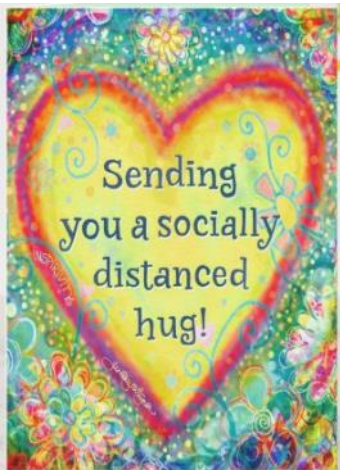
Grief Support
