

Pastors' Page



During the shutdown, Faith Lutheran was richly blessed by an amazing level of giving and we were able to welcome people back to in-person worship fairly soon, especially at our outdoor services in the summer. Still, our overall worship attendance has not returned to anywhere near the levels it was before the pandemic. But that has only accelerated a longer-term trend of declining church attendance here.

That is very worrisome, because there is no substitute for gathering with other Christians in God's presence to receive the gifts of grace through Word and sacrament. We are well aware of how busy life is for many people today, but that only makes it more important to prioritize weekly worship, so that it does not get pushed out by other activities.

At a retreat for our ministry team and church council members recently, we suggested making the purpose and value of worship the central focus of this year at Faith Lutheran. As part of that, we are proposing to the family of Faith the goal of *Plus 1*.

Plus 1 is a call for Faith's members to take on one of the following commitments:

- Attend *one* more worship service each month;
- Invite *one* person to come with you to a worship service;
- Take on *one* more point of engagement in or beyond Sunday services. Here are just a few examples:
 - Learn—Digging Deeper, Bible study, Faith Groups
 - Serve—usher, read, serve communion, help in children's ministry
 - Music—Faith Singers, Ringers of Faith, Messiah sing
 - Mission—New Hope Mission, Common Cup, Blessing Box
 - Fellowship—special events, Faith Family Fun, Seniors' Potluck

(Got all those covered already? Read further in this newsletter to find one more *Plus 1* option.)

In his final sermon at Faith Lutheran in 2008, Pastor Dave Christensen described our church as a sleeping giant with tremendous untapped potential. Even with all of the vital ministry that occurs here, that description still seems to fit in many ways. As we emerge from pandemic-formed habits, let's "wake up" one step at a time by taking on the *Plus 1* challenge!

Still looking for a good *Plus 1* option? As promised on page 1, here is another option. At Faith Lutheran's annual meeting in January, the congregation voted to increase the church's benevolence giving from 10% to 11% of General Fund offerings received. Faith's members might follow that example and increase their giving by 1%, as well. That, in turn, might allow the church to increase its benevolence to 12% next year! One step at a time...



Faith Forward: 150K for the Next 150 Greenhouse: Cultivating Faith



Faith Forward, the short fund-raising campaign that capped off the church's 150th anniversary celebration, has received nearly \$80,000 in gifts! (The formal campaign has ended, but gifts to it are still welcome.)

Those funds are now being put to work under a new name, *Greenhouse: Cultivating Faith.* A Greenhouse task force has begun meeting in hopes of welcoming a small group of seminary students as early as this fall for a year-long internship experience at Faith Lutheran.



Greenhouse is a name used by two other Lutheran churches with similar programs (or plans). We hope to work in concert with them as we seek to prepare leaders for the Church. Watch for more information on the Greenhouse project in coming months.

Help Provide for Refugees from Ukraine

Working with Faith Lutheran's Mission Partners

Ukrainian refugees are fleeing to many countries, including Germany and Estonia, where long-time mission partners of Faith Lutheran are preparing to give them shelter, food and

the love of Christ. These trustworthy, efficient missions are great avenues to provide aid directly to those who are suffering.

Katie Weikle, the daughter of Owen and Maria, and sister of Laura Stowman, Faith's Director of Children and Family Ministries, helps to lead a training center for Youth with a Mission in Nuremberg, Germany. She has asked for assistance in their efforts to house and feed refugees who have fled from Ukraine to Germany. The center has plans to welcome up to 40 of these desperate people and extend the love of Christ to them in countless other ways.



In Estonia, the Tartu Academy of Theology has begun an intensive effort to help meet the needs of some 15,000 refugees who have already fled to Estonia, with many more expected to follow. With funds from congregations like ours, TAT plans to house a small number of refugees at its Home of Hope and to help Estonian Lutheran churches do much more.

Our Partners from Estonia Will Be with Us on Sunday, April 24

Pastor Siimon Hamer looks forward to sharing with us their Spirit led efforts to bear witness to Jesus Christ through the Tartu Academy of Theology and its many ministries. This once overwhelmingly Lutheran country had its Christian population decimated through nearly 50 years of Soviet occupation beginning in World War Two. Their story is an exciting one, and it is one we at FLC are seeking to support and encourage against ongoing challenges.

Area churches will be invited to be with us here, Sunday, April 24, at 7 p.m. We also hope that his nephew, Mattias Hamer, will have an opportunity to meet with area youth. Those details are still being finalized.

On April 3, during the Digging Deeper hour, Steven and Jen Freund will be with us to share their two year experience in Peru during the pandemic. Stump the Pastor

Q: I just read Revelation 20:12-13, "Also another book was opened, the book of life. And the dead were judged according to their works, as recorded in the books....and all were judged according to what they had done." I thought we were saved by faith in Christ, not our works. What gives?

A: Those verses in Revelation do sound as if we are saved by our works or actions. That is confusing enough, but it is doubly confusing because in Revelation, the only "work" that really matters is clinging to faith in Christ alone as Lord and Savior. The central issue throughout the book is who really is Lord and, therefore, who deserves our trust.

Revelation was written for Christians who confessed that Jesus is Lord. The problem was that he had long since ascended into heaven and had not yet returned. Meanwhile, some Christians were being persecuted, ostracized by their families or excluded from business dealings because of their faith. It is apparent that some of those believers were wavering in their faith or looking for ways to compromise with the culture around them, going along to get along.

At the same time, the Roman emperors were claiming ever more god-like status. They adopted the titles Savior and Lord for themselves, and demanded that everyone in the empire burn incense before their statues. To all appearances, the emperors had complete authority, but to admit that, even by implication, rejected Christ as Lord. That meant apostasy, abandoning the faith.

Into this fraught situation, every part of the vision in Revelation declares that Christ Jesus alone is Lord and Savior, and exhorts Christians to cling to him, even at the cost of their lives. It urges believers not to compromise on even the tiniest detail, such as burning a pinch of incense to the emperor with their fingers crossed behind their backs. All of Revelation's concern about Christians' works concerned diligently maintaining their faith that Christ alone is Lord.

That remains true for us, as well. Our culture offers plenty of alternative "lords" and "saviors" to compete with our faith in Christ. It is as vital for Christians now as it was for those in the Roman Empire that none of our thoughts, words or actions contradict or deny our Christian faith. But that is essential precisely because we are saved by Christ alone and *not* by our works.
