#### Special Congregational Meeting on August 3rd!

In case you haven't heard, the Church Council has called a Special Congregational Meeting for the purpose of deciding whether to purchase the house at 144 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave SE. Any real estate acquisitions need to be approved by congregational vote, and any member eighteen or older can vote. But before you can vote on whether or not the church acquires an old house, one big question needs to be answered:

#### WHY?

Why would we want to buy a house? Haven't we done this before and regretted it? What is the plan and purpose for buying a house?

#### I was hoping you would ask.

For many years now, Faith has been praying about and seeking ways that we can respond to the pastor shortage in the Lutheran church. How can we encourage young people for ministry? With many of the old residential seminary institutions no longer trustworthy, how can we ensure seminarians receive sound training and faithful community?

Over the past year, a vision has started to take shape. We call it Faith Greenhouse — a year-long, community-embedded internship for seminarians or ministry-curious young adults. The dream is for a community of interns sharing a rule of life-rhythms of prayer, worship, and fellowship — while immersing themselves in the rich variety of congregational opportunities that Faith Lutheran presents. Our conviction is that such a program would energize and enrich both the interns and the life of the congregation.

But we lacked two things: Intern candidates and a place to build that community. What we did NOT lack, however, is support. Over the last several months of 2021, and continuing still, the Faith Forward campaign raised almost \$85,000! Then, after Greenhouse was presented at a Digging Deeper session, an enthusiastic and generous donor pledged another \$100,000 to go towards securing housing! God is good!

But the real estate market was not! Homes were priced high and going fast, and the rental options were less appealing. Then, a couple weeks ago, a house caught my eye. It was in our price range and in our neighborhood. The odd configuration of the home — with its duplex layout - would be awkward for a family, but perfect for a bunch of interns. Its large living and dining room present a perfect place for young adults to gather for prayer, Bible study, meals, and fun.



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So here we are, presented with a possible opportunity from the Lord. It's an old house, and has its typical old-house issues. It will no doubt need some upgrades and some major TLC. We currently do not have a bunch of interns beating down the door, but this might give us a door for them to beat. It's exciting and anxious all at the same time! That's why I urge you to make time in your busy summer schedules to join us at 6:30 p.m., on Wednesday, August 3, to ask questions, to be informed, to pray, and to vote, whether it's - "yea" or "nay."

#### <u>Stump the Pastor</u>

Q: In the past, the Jews recorded everyone and everything that happened. So why is Jesus or what he did not in any of the records?

A: This question seems simple and straightforward, but the answer has several layers to it. The Jewish people were thorough and careful historians. The Old Testament is filled with genealogies that record long family lines. Authors told (and sometimes *re*-told, as in I and II Chronicles) Israel's history with honesty and insight. In fact, one Jewish

historian named Josephus does mention Jesus and John the Baptist in his works, although he concluded wrongly that John was the more important person.

In another sense, though, Jesus is named in Jewish sources, repeatedly. It is just that he appears *prophetically*, not *explicitly*. That is, only after his life, death and resurrection did it become clear that Jesus had fulfilled many of the promises that Israel's prophets had made. God did not tell them ahead of time exactly *how* or *when* He would fulfill the promises he gave them to speak. So the prophets never name Jesus of Nazareth nor does he appear in any genealogy, but Christians can look back and recognize that he fulfilled all of God's promises to send a Messiah to save the world, and how all of God's work in Israel culminated in Jesus.

A third, tragic aspect of the answer is that once God did send Jesus, most Jewish people did not believe he was the Messiah. Jesus failed to meet any of the popular expectations of what the Messiah would do. Worse yet, they were certain that he was cursed by God, because he died on a cross. (Deuteronomy 21:22-23) So, even during and after Jesus' life, Jewish historians had little incentive to record Jesus' name or anything he did.

Blessedly, though, that was not true of *all* Jewish historians. We know little or nothing personally about the four evangelists who wrote accounts of Jesus' life, but their books show that they were all firmly grounded in the Old Testament and the history of Israel. The earliest Christian Church was made up entirely of Jewish

people who believed that Jesus was the Messiah of Israel. St. Paul was a devout Jewish rabbi who personally wrote almost a third of the New Testament. God inspired these faithful recorders of Jesus' life and its significance so that Christians down to our own day could "come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." (John 20:21)



#### Light Shining in the Darkness Lifts Spirits for Eyes to See A Mission Reflection from Pastor Paul Knudson

Sometimes we simply need to look up and out, and we can see and experience brilliant light shining in lands of deep darkness. Recently, before calling it a night, I picked up the current issue of *Christianity Today* magazine. After being immersed in too much reading of the overwhelming darkness that has too often blinded me to the light piercing the darkness, I happened upon an amazing series of stories of Christians lightening the dark days of Ukrainian refugees.

The country of Poland has cultural ties to Ukraine, but with an influx of three million refugees pouring across the border since February. 24, one would expect deep resentment drowning out little glimmers of kindness. Instead, the author of this article lifted my spirits with story after story of light shining in the darkness.

One tenth of one percent of the Polish population is evangelical Christian. Yet through these Christians, often with leadership from Christians who had emigrated to Poland in the past from Ukraine, an outpouring of love and care was meeting needs of people in despair. Indeed, many others in Poland were funneling resources through these evangelical Christians to meet needs that could only have poured forth through Divine inspiration.

When you become discouraged in well doing or possibly angered by all that seems to be darkening your life in this troubled world and time, I encourage you to look up and out to read or see stories that will inspire your spirit. Some of those stories are being created among us in this place through this congregation. Others are being created through people who light up the darkness through their witness. As we lift up our eyes, and the Spirit opens up our hearts to bring light into the darkness, all is brighter. Jesus Christ be praised. His beloved children near and far experience His Light. Thanks be to God.



#### An Update from Katie Weikle and YWAM Nuremberg

Initially, we housed fifty Ukrainians in dorm rooms typically used by our mission students, but are now down to twenty. With thousands of people within the city on waitlists, it has been difficult for Ukrainians to find housing. We have students coming in October, but will continue to house all Ukrainians that need our help.



We have opened a welcome center for all Ukrainians in our city. It offers basic information and guidance,

German language lessons, and has a thrift store with clothing and other household wares. This center has also made it possible for us to connect Ukrainians to churches in the city.




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We were able to send van loads of donated food, medicine, and mattresses every week in March, April, and May to our co-workers at the YWAM locations in Ternopil and Kyiv, where it was then delivered to hundreds of towns in Ukraine. It has been a blessing to work with and support our brave, tired friends working there.

We are about to send a second team to Ukraine to deliver primarily medical supplies, driving a new van that will remain in Ukraine after the trip. This team will be much closer to the front line than the first team was, who went from Nuremberg and served for two weeks in June.

We hope to help repair and rebuild homes in Ukraine before winter arrives. *Thank you Faith Lutheran for your continued prayers and support of YWAM!*
