Litany for Reformation Sunday

Martin Luther considered his Small Catechism to be one of his most valuable works and Lutherans through the ages have concurred. It remains an invaluable explanation of the theological heart of Christian faith. Each part of this litary reflects one of the five chief parts of the catechism: the Ten Commandments, Apostles' Creed, The Lord's Prayer and the sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion.

What does it mean that God's good will, Once thundered down from Sinai's hill, Is uttered now to pierce our hearts, Commandments that our God imparts?

L: The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah.

L: This is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my Law within them, and will write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they shall be my people.

L: No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the Lord," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord.

I am a sinner; you are upright. With me, there is an abundance of sin; in you is the fullness of righteousness. Therefore, I will remain with you, of whom I can receive, but to whom I may not give. Amen.
