Pastors' Page

The last generation has seen an intentional and quite successful effort to privatize religious faith in order to isolate it from society. Christianity seems to be the object of a special effort to relegate it to what happens inside churches or homes and within the hearts and minds of believers. The idea that Christianity has a public role in society or any vital influence on the culture has been increasingly denied as irrational, oppressive or anti-intellectual.

The reduction of Christianity to a private hobby for those who are interested is troubling, of course, but it is also amusing, because that contention itself betrays serious ignorance about how much the values and achievements of Western civilization are built on a foundation of Christian convictions. I was recently reminded of that truth by, of all things, a movie review about a film set in a pre-Christian, pagan culture. According to the review, the plot was driven solely by a burning desire for revenge and the end result was terribly violent, dark and full of grotesque pagan rituals. It was largely devoid of any redeeming quality.

So why watch such a movie, much less take the time to review it? The author did not dwell on the content of the film, but used it instead to illustrate what the world might still be like if Christianity had not taken root in so many lands. He noted that the movie gave him a sense of profound relief that pagan culture had been supplanted by Christianity, which proclaims a message unheard of to pagan thinking: a loving God who created humans in His image, granting inherent worth to all people, even the weak and powerless, even enemies and slaves.

Today, the belief in human dignity is often credited to ongoing improvements in human nature or advances in modern technology. But human nature is not improving; we remain "in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves." God alone has a solution for the dark side of human nature, so as Christian belief is pushed ever more to the margins of society, we should not be surprised to see the inhumanity and violence of the old pagan days return—and, in fact, each day's headlines testify that we may already have started down that road.

Because of St. Valentine's Day, we hear a lot of talk about love during February. That is wonderful, of course, but as we celebrate again this year, we would do well to recall that our basic concept of love—even between spouses or within families—was transformed by the Christian Gospel. As I John 4:10-11 declares, "In this is love, not that we loved God but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another." God's love in Christ Jesus is the model, the power, the standard and the inspiration for how we love other people, from within our own families to strangers who cross our paths.

Support groups can fill much of that space for you. In the presence of people who promise to keep everything said in the room where we meet private



Q: My Bible reading plan recently included II Thessalonians 2:1-12 and it was totally confusing. Who is "the son of destruction"? Verse 6 says "you know what is restraining him now," but I have no idea what that is! What is this passage talking about?

A: That is an excellent question! This text has puzzled readers since the day St. Paul wrote it. Unfortunately, no one but Paul himself knows the answer. In v. 5, he wrote, "Do you not remember that when I was still with you I told you these things?" He makes it clear that this passage is just a quick reminder of a lesson he had taught them in person.

The problem is that terms like "the son of destruction" do not appear anywhere else in Paul's letters, so we have no reliable way to fill out his summary with more detail. That has not stopped countless readers from offering up suggested explanations. Some of them are clearly wrong; some could be right. There is just no way to settle the question on this side of heaven.

The best we can do is to draw out the overall message of the text. Paul leaves no doubt that evil is real, powerful and incorrigibly opposed to God's will. As Christians, we ought not be surprised or discouraged by the depth of enmity toward God in the world. Yet, right in the midst of that, God is also at work to restrain evil and preserve His people until the day when Christ appears again in glory, destroys all evil and establishes the eternal kingdom of God.



Stewardship Matters


You have likely heard by now that offerings given to Faith Lutheran in 2022 fell about \$23,000 short of the church's expenses, even though giving was up a bit from 2021 and expenses were just less that what was budgeted. It was just a case of not quite making the ends meet. This is the first time in 13 years that Faith has faced a year-end deficit and it is disappointing to see that streak come to an end.

One of our elected leaders, however, suggested that this gap is actually a good reminder for the family of Faith not to become complacent in our giving or assume that the resources we need for this ministry will always be there. It is a good reason for all of us to examine how God has blessed us and how well our giving reflects that, and then adjust our giving this year in light of how God is providing for us. *Thank You* for your faithful and generous support of the mission God has entrusted to us at Faith!

The Horrific Ukraine Crisis: How Have We at Faith Responded?

Report from the Church in the World Ministry Team



Faith Lutheran has worked through trusted partners on the front lines of helping refugees. These partners are Youth with a Mission (YWAM) and The Tartu Academy of Theology (TAT) in Estonia.

We have one of our own members, Katie Weikle, working as an administrative leader of YWAM'S training center for young adults and others going out to multiple countries to bear witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ. We gave towards her modest stipend through a \$2,500 donation in 2022. As she has reported, for much of the past year they had refugees packed into facilities usually occupied by those coming for training. They also have gathered supplies to take into Ukraine for relief of their suffering, using vans stuffed with these items only to take other refugees out to safety.

At the end of the year, our team and the council approved sending \$2,500 to the relief work done by the national organization of YWAM within Ukraine. This came out of designated funds from our mission budget.

The other group we assisted was the work of the Tartu Academy of Theology in Estonia. This Baltic country, occupied by the Soviet Union for 50 years, knows full well the horror that goes with what Russia is capable of doing. Far more refugees have found haven in the three Baltic countries; Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia, than can really be handled. TAT has housed several families as they in time find other places to stay. Our annual contribution of \$3,000 to TAT, to assist them in their witness of bringing Christ back to their largely atheistic country, was in part re-directed to meet this ongoing crisis.

Thank you also, members of FLC, for any ways you may have found to stand with people of Ukraine in their time of suffering beyond our ability to comprehend. Thank you one and all.

New Hope Mission Society Update

NHMS has started the year off well and there are numerous things going on in India to continue spreading the Word and proclaim Jesus as our Savior. We have nearly collected enough funds to video tape KK Alavi's story, but could use a little more to help cover production and travel costs. Please contact Pastor Scott, Pastor Paul or Jeff if you would like to donate to this project or to NHMS in general. Wonderful things only happen when supporters like you donate.

Parent Huddle: Date Your Spouse

If someone were to ask me what is one of the best things to do for your children, I would say date your spouse. Keep investing in your marriage.

Life gets busy and time is an all-too-elusive commodity. You might both work. Children have school and extra-curricular activities. You might volunteer in the community, stay connected with friends, go to a Bible study and have just enough time to do some chores before your head hits the pillow.

When life gets busy, you can be tempted to cut corners—like pushing aside exclusive time with your spouse. However, if that happens too often, you are going to look at your spouse after your children are all grown and out of the house and think, "Who is this stranger?"

Prioritizing your marriage when your children are young benefits you and your spouse, but it also benefits your children. Think about it. What is something you wish for your children when they are adults? Lots of parents wish for their children to find spouses who will love and support them. You and your spouse can model a happy and healthy marriage. You can show your children what healthy communication looks like and how spouses can love and support each other well during difficult times.

"In a study about the importance of couple time by The National Marriage Project, researchers W. Bradford Wilcox and Jeffrey Dew note 'that the quality of the relationship between parents is one of the key factors associated with the cognitive, social, and emotional development of their children." (Amy Van Veen, *Married with Kids: How to Keep Your Relationship Strong*) By investing in your marriage you are actually investing in your children too!

So how do you date your spouse?

- Set up a weekly date night. You can go out and get a babysitter or date from home. After children go
 to bed or keep them busy for an hour and say that mom and dad are on a date.
- Check in with your spouse daily. Ask them how they are really feeling. Ask what they are excited for
 or nervous about this coming week. Then follow up and ask questions.
- **Dream together.** What are your hopes for this year? Hopes for your children, careers, faith.
- Do things together. Cooking dinner. Dishes. Laundry. Walking the dog.
- **Show love.** Know what your spouse's love language is and show it. Words of affirmation, quality time, physical touch, gifts or acts of service.
- Have fun! Do something unexpected. Create shared memories.


