At a recent staff meeting, Laura Stowman, Faith's Director of Children and Family Ministry, projected that there are so many children in Sunday School that she will need to use every classroom in the church starting next year. Other spaces will have to be identified for some Digging Deeper and other classes on Sundays.

One of the newer families at Faith reported that they had first tried to attend the Foundation service several years ago, but it was so full that day that they couldn't find a place to sit. They ended up joining another church for a while before returning to Faith and squeezing into what space is available.

Some long-time members of the church who generally enter and exit by the southwest sanctuary door commented on how few other people from the congregation they ever see. At least four different entrances into the church are regularly used on Sundays, so there is no common space where everyone is present.

These are just three anecdotes that illustrate the need for Faith Lutheran to complete Phase II of its long-term building plan. It is a tremendous blessing to see every square inch of our church being used for ministry, not just on Sundays, but throughout the week. It is also a great blessing—though of a different sort—not to

have enough room to handle all the ministry opportunities God keeps giving us here.

Over the last year, the Phase II Building Committee (P2BC) has been meeting with the architect who drew the original design for what we now call Phase II, before the project was split into two parts in order to make it affordable. Because Phase II has to fit on the city block that the church owns, the revised plan is not dramatically different from what was envisioned 15 years ago, but many important and exciting changes have been made.

Now it is time for the whole congregation to get in on the fun. The P2BC will present its work so far at the annual meeting of the congregation on Sunday, January 28 at 12:00 noon. The meeting will also include the usual reports and elections, but the P2BC presentation will be the highlight of the gathering. Put it on your calendar now so you don't miss this exciting look into the future of Faith Lutheran Church. Please pray for the P2BC members and the whole building process, for the resources needed to complete Phase II and that the finished project will serve God's will and purpose for vears to come.

O: Why isn't the visit of the Wise Men to see Jesus ever read during church?

A: It isn't quite the case that the account of the Wise Men's visit in Matthew 2 is *never* read in church, but it is a rare occurrence. The reason for that gets a little complicated, but here it is.

In addition to the six main seasons (Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter and Pentecost), the church calendar also marks many special festival days. Some of those festivals move to the nearest Sunday. For example, Reformation Day is October 31, but it is celebrated on the last Sunday in

October, whatever date that is, while All Saints' Day is November 1, but moves ahead to the first Sunday in November, whatever date that may be.

Many other festival days, however, stay put, mostly because they are tied to other days on the calendar. That is the case with the visit of the Wise Men. It is celebrated on Epiphany Day, which is the first day of the season of Epiphany and comes right after the 12 days of Christmas. Since Christmas Day is always December 25, Epiphany Day always falls on January 6. Most years, that is a weekday, but the first Sunday after Epiphany Day marks the Baptism of our Lord, when Jesus came to be baptized by John the Baptist and that is considered important enough that Epiphany Day never displaces it.

In designing its calendar this way, the Church intended Epiphany Day to be treated like Christmas Day, with special worship services no matter what day of the week it was. Some churches still gather for Epiphany Day worship, but the practice has mostly faded away. The unfortunate result is that, in most years, Epiphany Day passes by largely unnoticed and the Wise Men's visit is rarely heard during Sunday services.

Stewardship

For many years, offerings to Faith Lutheran have fallen well short of expenses during the year, requiring a tremendous outpouring of gifts in November and December to meet its annual expenses. Typically, the church receives 20-25% of all the offerings in a year in those two months. Thanks to God and the family of Faith, that late flood of giving has covered the gap most years and we pray that it will again this year. As of this writing, the need is still about \$85,000, even though the church will under-spend the 2023 budget by more than \$26,000.

Faith's leaders are profoundly grateful for those annual floods of offerings, but the habit of relying on enormous year-end giving is not a healthful way for the church to operate. The church's expenses continue steadily throughout the year and cannot be put off until the last two months. Should a year ever arrive when the flood of year-end gifts does not materialize, the church could be dangerously over-extended, even though spending was well within the budget approved at the annual meeting.

Could 2024 be the year that we break this habit or at least start to shift our offerings to spread them out more evenly? One key way to do that is to shift the focus of our giving from what the church needs to how God has blessed each one of us to be a blessing to others. If we, as the family of Faith, embraced giving a percentage of our income (whether 1%, 5%, 10% or some other portion) and gave it on a first-fruits basis, that is, as the first expense we record each week or month, the famine/feast cycle could be evened out and put our congregation on a much stronger financial base. Please pray for God to lead us toward this goal.

During the season of Epiphany, join us for a *Vespers* service featuring the beloved "Holden Evening Prayer." *Vespers* will be held in the Sanctuary on Wednesday evenings at 6:45 p.m. and run from January 10 through February 7. If you are interested in helping to lead these beautiful services, contact Austin Willhite for more information.

Where do these worship services come from? Both *Matins* (Latin for "morning") and *Vespers* (Latin for "evening") come from traditional practices of the

Christian church. *Matins*, also called Morning Prayer, gives thanks to God for the light of a new day and for protection through the night. *Vespers*, also called Evening Prayer, thanks God for the day at its close and serves as a time of reflection, as well as asking for protection through the night. Both services have significant imagery and language of light. Through prayers, psalms, and Gospel canticles, participants thank, praise, and call upon the light of Christ shining in and banishing the darkness.

Matins and Vespers are two of seven canonical hours (daily times of Christian prayer) that have remained a part of Lutheran liturgy today. Though their origins are old, these services are not just for the ancient monks of Middle Age monasteries. We encourage you to embrace these services as a time of respite from the busy week. Join us this month for Vespers, featuring the "Holden Evening Prayer."

The "Holden Evening Prayer" Vespers order was written by Marty Haugen in 1986 and has remained a favorite of Christians around the world since. While on a sabbatical, Haugen, who is originally from Wanamingo, Minnesota, stayed at Holden village located in the North Cascade mountains of Washington. Once a mining town, Holden Village now hosts a year-round retreat center for visitors. Inspired by the people of Holden Village in the peace and quiet of their slower winter season, Haugen composed and dedicated the "Holden Evening Prayer" during his stay. As his music and interpretation have inspired many Christians around the world, I hope that our services can be a place of peace and light for you during this dark and cold time of the year.


Annual Meeting Sunday, January 28 at 12:00 noon







of New Hope Mission Society and the last 25% will be sent to the Friends of Madagascar Mission. Thank you for your generous gifts in support of these missions.

Quality Conversation with your Child

As a parent, you probably have a deep desire to have a strong relationship with your child. You have reflected on the relationships you have with your parents and other parental figures, appreciating what you've had and longing for more for your child. But how do you develop that relationship?

The art of quality conversation helps develop strong relationships. Conversations are incredibly important. Think about the conversations you've had with people over this past week, or the conversations you have with your dearest friends. The talks you've had with your parents during major life changes like when you were first pregnant, buying a house, getting married, starting your first adult career, or going off to college. Or the conversations at the dinner table when you were a child or teenager, either at weekly family meals or large family holidays. Maybe even conversations you had with a teacher, coach or mentor. How did you feel after those conversations? Besides joy, you probably felt known by them; a sense of closeness.

But what does a conversation with your child look like?

You should find one-on-one time to have conversations with your children. It could be in the car while you run errands, picking them up from school or practice, tossing a ball in the yard, doing a chore at home, going on a special outing, or at the beginning or ending of the day.

You can ask them about their day using specific questions that will have an answer beyond "yes," "no," or "fine," like "What was the best or worst part of today? Did anyone get in trouble today? What did you think about before you fell asleep last night?" Talk about life with them. "What's your favorite thing to do with mom/dad/sibling/friend? What do you think you are really good at? Bad at? Is there anything you want to tell me or ask me about? What do you pray about when you talk to God?"

It can help to show vulnerability. Sometimes your children want to share something with you, but they don't know how to start the conversation. Talk about what life was like or what you thought about when you were their age.
