

Lent starts on Wednesday, March 5. Because of this, I thought it might be helpful to provide you with a few Lenten fun facts:

- Lent is a time we set aside each year to remember the love of God that is poured out through Christ Jesus on the cross in His death; and His defeat of death, sin and Satan in Christ's death and resurrection that brings Eternal Life to you. This season has a penitential character, a solemn nature to it. This is to help us remember to be repentant and remind us of our sin and our mortality.
- Lent begins a bit later this year, because Easter is later this year. The date of Easter is tied to the Jewish festival of Passover, and computed through a calculation known as *computus paschalis* (Latin for Easter computation). Basically, it is determined by the first Paschal full moon or the first full moon on or after March 21.
- Lent begins on Ash Wednesday
- The date of Ash Wednesday is determined by counting back 46 days from Easter. Lent is a 40-day season, but it doesn't count the Sundays, since every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection.
- Ash Wednesday features the imposition of Ashes as a reminder to us that we will return to the dust from which we are made (Genesis 3:19). It also reminds us of Jesus' defeat of death and sin on the cross, and the atonement for our sin by His blood
- The liturgical color for Lent is purple, a color of penitence.

This year, after taking a year off to let our interns preach, we will once again welcome pastors from our local partner congregations in LCMC. We'll hear from Pastor Brian Nehring from Christ the King, Pastor Aaron Albrecht from St. Matthew's, Pastor Brian Lauer from Zion, and our

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Ash Wednesday and Lent Schedule

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5, 2025. Faith Lutheran will have two services with Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion at 12 noon and 6:30 p.m.

Mid-week Lenten services will continue for the following five weeks on Wednesday evenings at 6:30 p.m. (*Note for confirmation students:* You will meet with your small groups after each week's Lenten service.)

Holy Week will follow, beginning with Palm Sunday on April 13, Maundy Thursday (including first communion for sixth–grade students) on April 17, Good Friday on April 18, and Easter on April 20. Please put these dates on your calendars now so that you and your family are available to participate in these very important and special services.

Let Us Ever Walk With Jesus

As a guy who is saturated in music every day, I am more susceptible than the average person to the incessant "ear worm." I am sure you can relate as



that catchy commercial jingle you heard last night on TV bounces around in your head as you go about your day. Fortunately for me, it is not the latest Burger King ad that turns over in my brain, but the enduring church hymn. As we enter the season of Lent, one lyric has been resonating with me, "Let us ever walk with Jesus." This hymn of commitment to follow in Christ's footsteps has long been a favorite of mine. The text beautifully crafts the message of the Gospel through the four-stanza hymn. "Let us ever walk with Jesus, follow his example pure" What does it mean for us as present-day Christians to follow in Christ's footsteps? Through Epiphany, we have seen miracles and witnessed healings, we have heard Christ teach and watched as he grew from a boy, was baptized, and called his disciples. Now we follow Christ as he makes his way to the cross. "Full of faith and hope and love, let us do our Father's bidding." The reflection and self-examination that comes during Lent reminds us that the wages of sin is death. St. Paul tells us to "mortify all passion that would lead us into sin," for through baptism we have been united with Christ in a death like his. So "let us gladly die with Jesus. Since by death he conquered death." This is how we follow Christ. We live in the promise that we will also rise with Jesus. Let us ever walk through our work, relationships, family life, and faith with Jesus. "For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be reunited with him in a resurrection like his." (Romans 6:5)

Q: I heard someone talk about water baptism versus spirit baptism. I thought there was only one baptism?

A: Lutherans, in line with most of the Christian Church, believe that there is only one baptism, in which God pours out the Holy Spirit on those who are baptized. The

Biblical word translated as baptism means to dip in water, so it is directly tied to the use of water. Holy Baptism is a gift that is complete in itself. It never needs to be repeated and it does not need anything more added to it.

On the basis of a few Bible passages (Acts 2 and 8:14-17, among others), Pentecostal or charismatic churches separate baptism from a later experience of the Holy Spirit. That so-called "Spirit baptism" is evidenced by a person receiving a particular spiritual gift, such as speaking in ecstatic tongues. These churches consider this experience of the Holy Spirit as more significant than actual baptism and believe it marks the fullness of Christian identity and experience.

Perhaps unintentionally, those convictions can lead to a subtle denigration of Holy Baptism ("water baptism") as having little importance or consequence. In fact, such churches do not view Holy Baptism as a sacrament in which God is active, but only as a sign to the world that believers have accepted Jesus as their Lord (not that Jesus has accepted them as His children—note who is the subject and object of each phrase).

While some people undeniably do receive special spiritual gifts, the conviction that every Christian must demonstrate such a gift in order to have full Christian faith is not supported by the Bible. In fact, St. Paul argues against such thinking in I Corinthians 12 and 14.

The promise of Christ, for example in the Great Commission in Matthew 28:18-20, and the dominant teaching of the Christian Church is that there is one baptism into Christ in which God creates a covenant of salvation with us, pours out the Holy Spirit on us and incorporates us into the Church, the Body of Christ. "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:4-6) That's a promise you can take to the bank!

Stewardship Matters



Why is stewardship—the sound management of our time, talent and treasure—such a vital topic in the Bible and the Church? At its root, it is not a matter of budgets or bills the church has to pay. It is primarily a theological issue.

Because we are creatures, made by God, we are naturally more in tune with creation, which we can see and experience, than we are with God, who is invisible to us and can

be apprehended only by faith. That reality makes it really natural for us to treat creation as more important or having more value than the Creator.

St. Paul named exactly that problem in Romans 1:25. He insisted that even Gentiles who did not know God's self-revelation to Israel could still discern God's reality and will by observing creation, but, he wrote, "They exchanged the truth about God for a lie and worshiped and served the creature rather than the Creator, who is blessed forever! Amen."

Biblical stewardship practices help to remind us that everything in creation—from our own lives to our possessions to the world around us—are gifts from God and not to be worshiped or thought to have ultimate value. As we give of our time, ability and money, we come to appreciate them more as tools God gives us to serve our neighbors and support the work of His kingdom. There is freedom and joy in honoring the distinction between the Creator and His creation.

Join Pastor Dave in the Conference Room as we confess our struggles as parents of teens and how we can intentionally strive to connect with our kids.




New Member Orientation Class


You are invited to join the planning committee on Friday, March 7, at 11 a.m. Come with your ideas and suggestions as we start to put some plans into place.

Our congregation has entered into a partnership with the Bole congregation where he serves. We are helping them sustain mission outreaches that, in time, have become independent churches.


Faith Lutheran Church Support Groups




Lent

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
