

Since this issue of *Faith Matters* will come out shortly before the 4th of July, I was thinking about the relationship between the Church and the government, and how Christians relate to them. I had just read an essay about the literary genius of C.S. Lewis, author of *The Screwtape Letters and The Chronicles of Narnia*, and a world-class scholar. It included a quote from Lewis that I had not read before. "A sick society must think much about politics, as a sick man must think much about his digestion."

My first reaction to that statement focused on "must think much." Our society is obsessed with politics, due in part to the 24-hour news cycle spawned by cable television and the internet, although I think it has more serious and destructive roots, as well. This obsession stirs up anxiety and fear, not least in people who are *not* fixated on the news, but perceive how overheated our political world has become.

The day I wrote this article, however, brought the horrific news of the assassination of a Minnesota state legislator and her husband and the attempted murder of another legislator and his wife. Early reports indicate that the attacks were "politically motivated" and that the murderer left a "manifesto," though at this point its contents have not been released. At the same time, destructive riots are plaguing many cities around the country, purportedly in opposition to federal government policies.

That news made a different phrase from C.S. Lewis' statement jump out at me, "a sick society." When political disagreements increasingly spur people to physical violence or rabble-rousing language, it reveals a society that is seriously ill, perhaps sick unto death. Politics, of course, has always been a bare-knuckled pursuit, but in a nation of laws like ours, political violence has been blessedly rare. We remember names like John Brown or Lee Harvey Oswald precisely because such violence has not been the norm and their evil actions stick out as disturbing exceptions to the rule.

As Christians, how can we address this volatile political situation, beyond deploring violent acts and trying to tone down incendiary words? One vitally important resource is Martin Luther's doctrine of the Two Kingdoms or the Two Reigns of God. It is not a simple teaching, but it is very helpful for navigating life in this world broken by sin. Here are some of his key insights.

- 1) Christians live in two realms, not just one; God rules over them both, but in different ways;
- 2) physically, we live in this created world, which "God so loved...that He gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16);

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- 3) the eternal life God desires everyone to have is not part of this created world; this world is temporal, time-limited; it is not possible to establish the Kingdom of God in this temporal realm;
- 4) the coming Kingdom of God, however, has already dawned when Christ was resurrected on Easter;
- 5) Christians are brought into that new kingdom by Holy Baptism and live in the overlap between this world and the next; we exist in this world, but "our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.' (Philippians 3:20);
- 6) thus, Christians live *in* this world, but we are not *of* the world; we can devote ourselves to serving our neighbors just because our eternal future has already been secured in Christ;
- 7) that means that all the affairs of this world, though important, are *never* ultimate; only Christ and his kingdom will endure forever.

That last point, I believe, is a key source of the political extremism afflicting our day. Human beings are instinctively religious and will embrace some religious conviction or another, even those who insist God does not exist. In our day, as faith in God has diminished and religious practice waned, many people have made politics their religion, instead. They fail to see that politics, though important, is temporal and has no ultimate value or importance and once secondary matters are given ultimate status, people will go to extreme lengths to defend or enforce them.

The cure for our society's political illness is to repent and turn our hearts back to the Lord. If that were to happen, even on a grand scale, it would not establish God's Kingdom on earth. That cannot happen. But it would provide a proper and much healthier perspective on political issues, and keep people from treating secondary matters as if they had ultimate importance.

Stewardship Matters

At the end of May, year-to-date offerings to Faith Lutheran Church were slightly *lower* than they were at the end of May, 2024 and nearly \$80,000.00 lower than the church's year-to-date expenses, even though they remain below budget. Offerings in the month of May alone were nearly \$10,000.00 below May of last year.

As we head into the summer months, this deficit is a big concern and it does not help that, in recent years, September offerings have also been quite low. The church's expenses remain steady through all twelve months of the year, but its cash reserves can only cover so much deficit spending.

There is always economic uncertainty in the world, yet few of us face financial crises. If all the members of the family of Faith gave *in proportion to their income* (whether 1%, 5%, 10% or more), there is no doubt that offerings would more than cover all of our church's ministry expenses.

Could we avoid opening up an enormous hole in the General Fund that has to be made up in the last few weeks of the year? Please prayerfully examine your giving in light of God's steadfast provision for you and the call to be faithful stewards of all that God entrusts to us. For "God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work." (II Corinthians 9:8)



Stump the Pastor

Q: When did Jesus know he was God's son and what his purpose was?

A: This question from one of our Faith Groups is a great one to keep in your pocket for when you stand before the throne of God one day! It is one on a long list of gaps in the Biblical record that fire people's curiosity.

The Bible provides no explanation for how Jesus' two natures co-existed as he grew. Our human ability to imagine it is so limited that we are likely to downplay either his humanity or his divinity, no matter how we try to hold them together. For example, we cannot imagine how a toddler could avoid the "terrible twos," but if Jesus went through that defiant stage of development, how does that fit in with his having a sinless nature?

The closest we can come is the sole Biblical account from Jesus' childhood at the end of Luke 2, when he stayed behind in the temple in Jerusalem. At 12 years old (13 was then considered the age of adulthood), Jesus was clearly aware of his divine nature. That is why he called the temple "my Father's house," which obviously did not refer to Joseph. Yet, that awareness was also not fully informed. He craved more knowledge, which is why he lost all track of time as he talked with the temple priests. When Mary and Joseph finally found him, he asked why they were searching for him (and why Mary was so angry). That could sound a bit impertinent, but it was more likely totally innocent, as if he genuinely could not fathom why they did not know where he was—a decidedly immature outlook. (It might qualify as the most 12-year-old statement in the history of 12-year olds.) Still, Luke ends the chapter by specifically noting that "he went down with (his parents) to Nazareth and was obedient to them."

There is a mixture there that cannot be entirely reconciled or completely distinguished. Perhaps our best bet is to consider Jesus growing up with a divine and a human nature as part of the miracle of the Incarnation itself, which was, at one and the same time, surprisingly normal and, at various points, utterly confusing.

Mission Partner, Friends of Madagascar Mission, Introduction and Pressing Need

A long-term major focus of global mission outreach within our Lutheran family has been the country of Madagascar. Generations of witnesses from America have reached out with the Good News of Jesus Christ to this island nation off the coast of Africa.

Presently, this witness is coming through Friends of Madagascar Mission (FOMM) working with the national Lutheran Church there. The focus in part is to help the indigenous church body in their Great Commission witness. In various ways this mission organization has been providing assistance in training and sending these local witnesses throughout this country of several million people.

At the same time, FOMM recognizes that the pressing needs in this impoverished country cannot be ignored. Some ten-million people face huge struggles simply to have water to drink that is safe for human consumption.

Working with local people who know the huge challenges of contaminated wells and the dramatic costs of drilling through rock to get to clear water is driving FOMM to dream big.

From normal human hesitancy to imagine beyond common sense to a Spirit-driven passion to do what seems impossible, FOMM is calling for a response of \$1,000,000 to meet this need. We at FLC could be a part of this response. You can look in the future for information on how we may stand with our partners at FOMM to bring life-giving clear water to brothers and sisters in this faraway land.

Incidentally, a long time personal friend, Pastor David Lerseth, is the central leader along with several others, of this witness through FOMM. None of the "staff" are paid for their leadership. All money donated goes directly to the mission work.

Leap of Faith Capital Campaign

Several people have suggested recently that members of Faith may be holding back on making a commitment to Leap of Faith until they are sure that Phase II of the building project will actually be completed. That may or may not be the case, but the fact that people keep mentioning it suggests that it might be happening.

If it is, the logic behind it is understandable from a financial perspective, but as a giving tactic, it largely insures that the project will never be built. The only way to realize this much-needed ministry space is if more members of the church step forward in faith and commit major gifts to the campaign *so that* Phase II can be built. If large numbers wait to give *until* the project is underway, the church will never have enough funding to secure a construction loan or be able to borrow whatever remaining funds are needed.

Calling this campaign Leap of Faith was no accident! That is exactly what is required for it to have any chance of succeeding. Have you taken the leap?



Music and Worship


Worship Snapshot: The Lutheran Liturgical Tradition

We Lutherans have always had a unique relationship with tradition. If you close your eyes right now, I'm sure you can clearly visualize



By this point, you may be asking yourself, "What is liturgy and what does it mean?" Liturgy is usually defined as "the work of the people." Christians understand this word in a sense of willing service to God because of what he has done first for them; worship conducted in a proper, Spirit-guided way. The liturgical order we follow on Sunday mornings at Faith is the corporate structure of the worship experience and practice, centered in hearing God's Word and the proper administration of the Sacraments. Following a liturgical order provides a way for all worshipers to participate. It has become our habitual tradition. Confessing our sin, hearing the absolution, confessing our beliefs through the creeds and praying the Lord's Prayer become second nature. If you have been in First Word worship the past couple of Sundays, you may have noticed that we began to learn a new liturgy, the Service of the Word. This liturgical order is appropriate for Sundays in which the Sacrament of Holy Communion is not observed. This service order puts emphasis on God's Word, hence the name, throughout the entirety of worship, which was most important to Martin Luther as stated above. Though the music and specific verbiage may be new to you, the tradition is all the same. I hope you enjoy using this new service order in worship and that it may facilitate spiritual growth and strengthen your faith.


Day Camp
