Stewardship Matters

Stewardship teaching often focuses on generous giving in proportion to one's income, but Biblical stewardship extends beyond giving to managing all of our assets. In Luke 12, Jesus prefaced his Parable of the Rich Fool with a warning against greed, but the story itself is more about a lack of planning.

The farmer in the parable was wrong to put so much trust in his earthly wealth, but as God informed him that he was about to die, He asked, "And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" The farmer had no plan, no thought beyond his own security as to how his ample goods could be put to use, so his sudden death left his big new storehouses filled with abundant crops in limbo.

The parable urges Christians first of all to keep our trust centered in God, not our possessions. It also emphasizes, the importance of planning out how our assets can be put to work, during our lives or after our deaths. Most people naturally leave their estates to their children, but what else could those funds support? How else could your assets be put to work for the Church and the world?

Pastor Paulus Pilgrim has often related an idea that came to him from a parishioner, who, in his estate plan, had made the Church his "last child," giving it an equal share along with each of his children. It was a creative, generous strategy that benefited his family members, but also the ministry of God's Kingdom. Have you considered making Faith Lutheran or a Christian mission the "last child" in your estate? It is one of many ways to think about faithful stewardship of all our assets.



Bible Camp for Big Kids

Bible camps are usually thought to be a ministry to children and youth, but they are not only for young people. The Bible camps that Faith Lutheran supports, Mt. Carmel and Ingham-Okoboji, both offer retreats for adults, as well as "Elderversity" gatherings designed for people over 55. Q: My study Bible refers to the Deutero-Pauline letters. I know St. Paul wrote most of the letters in the New Testament, so which letters are these?

A: Like all fields of work or study, Biblical scholarship has its own specialized lingo, most of it based on Greek or Latin terms. The prefix *deutero*- is a Greek word that means second or one step removed. The title of the book of Deuteronomy means "second law," because it repeats the Ten Command-

ments and some other laws that were given earlier in Exodus or Leviticus.

The term Deutero-Pauline reflects the idea of "one step removed." Ephesians, Colossians, II Thessalonians, I and II Timothy and Titus all have Paul's name on them, but many (though not all) scholars believe that he did not personally write them. For example, they use some words or concepts differently than Paul does in the letters that he definitely wrote or they employ a different style of writing that just does not "sound" like Paul. Still today, avid readers can "hear" how a familiar or favorite author "sounds."


Because of these and other differences, scholars suspect that those letters are Deutero-Pauline; that is, they are one step removed from Paul himself, written by students or followers of his. If so, there is nothing surprising or scandalous about it. It was a common practice in the first century. To write in the name of one's teacher was a way to honor him (or, less commonly, her) as the source of the actual author's knowledge, and to vouch for the reliability and integrity of his work. To do that today would be considered fraudulent or dishonest, but it was widely accepted in the ancient world.

These questions of authorship fascinate scholars, but they do not affect the authenticity of the letters. The Church discerned which books were inspired Scripture based chiefly on their content, not their authorship. Whether books like Ephesians and Colossians were written by Paul or by a devoted follower of his, they were recognized by the Christian Church as inspired writings that proclaim God's Word to us.
